Leg banding Procedure courtesy of the NATIONAL FINCH SOCIETY



The most important thing to remember when you begin to band a finch is to do it over a counter or table in case the chick makes a sudden move, it will not fall to the floor.



The age of the bird to be banded varies with the species. Generally it will be between five and six days old. You can tell by looking at the ankle joint (the joint where the toes come together) and the size of the band.



The band is generally placed on the right leg of the bird. Banding just before the nightly roost will help prevent picking of the band by the parents. By the next morning the birds will have forgotten about the band.

Have the band ready with a toothpick (or other blunt instrument and a lubricant. Hold the chick firely but in a way not to cut off the air supply or to burt the bird.



Put a little bit of lubricant on the bird's foot and slide the band over the front three toes and finally over the ankle joint. The back toe will probably have to be pried out from under the band with a toothpick. The band is now in the proper location between the ankle and elbow joints.



It is best to check on the chick after a few days to eake sure the band has not slipped off. Before banding, make sure the band is right side up so that it can be easily read.

ANNUAL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS: :

The Annual Meeting of the National Finch and Softbill Society was held Saturday. November 17, 1988 at the San Diego Princess Resort during the National Cage Bird Show. The meeting was held at 10 a.m. with 61 members and guests in attendance.

The minutes and Treasurer's reports were read and accepted.

President Parlee gave a in-depth State of the Society message, tracing the society from its' inception to the present and his hopes for the societies' future.

Al Decoteau introduced Fanel Judges and apprentices that were in attendance. He also explained the Panel and gave a report on Standards.

Dr. Val Clear was asked to speak to the group. He was awarded a plaque of appreciation for judging the 1988 NFS National. He selected a Toco toucan as best, owned by NFS member John Rice.

Hal Koontz, Finchsave director gave a report of the progress of the program and changes that were enacted at the Committee meeting the day before. He stated "we are more flexible now". Many finches that previously required 5 pairs for participation now only require 3 or less pairs. Some very rare species will require only one pair.

The NFS 1988 Toucan Tee-shirt and new Java Rice Bird coffee mugs were presented by Promotions chair Bill Pariee. He also announced that the NFS Handbook was on sale at the NFS booth or by mail order through the Membership Services copt.

The Board of Directors announce that all NFS memberships for 1988 were going to be extended by 2 months because of the NFS bulletin delays. Everyone will receive his or ser 6 issues for the year.

All Decoteau announced that the $n\epsilon$: Society Finch Standard revisions were not accepted. He sited members conterns that the dilutes and Chestnut varieties need better differentiation.

The Board also announced that at no additional charge all club affiliates that normally receive rosettes with their iffiliation, will now receive 3 additional rosettes for Best Unflighted bias in show.

The top five awards for the National were present d to John Rice, Marty Von Raesfeld. Brian Mandarich, Hal Koontz and Bill Poviewas respectively.

President Parlee ended the meeting at Noon by awarding the first even NFS <u>Lifetime Achievement Awards</u> to Cecil Gunby and Hall Koo \cdots . These awards honor those who have achieved 200 points on the show ber.



Butterflies, Canaries, Soar Under Dome

An Avian introduction

On Sunday, October 23rd, eighteen canaries and finches took up residence beneath the dome of the Des Moines Botanical Center. Donated by various members of the Mid America Cagedird Society, the birds add another. naturalistic dimension to life under the dome.

Unlike parrots and other cagebirds, canaries and finches are primarily seed feeders; and theretore, pose no hazzard to the many species in the permanent collection. In addition to being fed a dally diet of mixed seed and grit, the canaries have been observed delicately dining on such unwanted insect pests as aphids.

Over time and with the installation of nesting baskets, it is believed that the different species will gradually naturalize and raise tuture generations in amongst the branches of the big weeping figs and other tropical trees.

Having spent their entire lives as cagebirds, the new inhabitants spent several days clustered closely together in the orange or black olive trees located adjacent to the main potio area. Gradually, the birds became more adventuresome, spread their wings and explored the many floral nooks and crannles. From the uppermost fronds of the Washingtonia palms to the giant leaves of the taro plant, the canaries and finches have discovered a seemingly unending number of places to perch and display their colorful plummage for all who poss by to admire.

Although quiet for the first couple of weeks, the canaries have been ever increasingly filling the dame with the melodic notes of their enchanting song causing many a visitor to stop and listen. Indeed, if early comments are any indication, the birds will be an exceptionally popular attraction.

Our deep appreciation to the members of the Mid America Cagebird Society for their generosity and sense of civic mindedness.

"FINCHSAVE"

By Hel M. Koontz

Prefaced by Bill Parlee

On the following pages is the entire "Finchsave" Program; it's procedures and rules and regulations. All the information you need to understand the program is here. There is however some changes in the program that you should be aware of. The only changes in the program from the following pages are listed here.

During our National Finch and Softbill Society Annual Show and Meeting, the annual meeting of the "Finchsave" Committee was held. In attendance was Hal Koontz, Dr. Val Clear and Bill Parlee. The other two members were unable to attend, however, a quorum was present to conduct business.

The Committee reviewed the progress of the program and the input from participants as well as the general membership.

The Committee felt that the program although successful could be even more so if some changes were made. Siting the most common suggestion from membership, the Committee discussed several methods in which to increase participation while insuring the integrity of the program.

After lengthly discussion the Committee decided to keep the 5 pair requirement intact as a suggestion number of pairs to have for successfully completing the program. The big change however, is that now for semi-rare finches or Softbills you may meet requirements for participation with only three pairs and in some cases you may participate with only one pair, in the case of birds that may not be obtained in a reasonable manner.

The Committee felt that this would be the most logical answer to those who have expressed an interest in participation in the "Finchsave" program but could not meet the pair requirements.

If you have previously applied and were denied we suggest you reapply at this time. If you have been going to apply but have not because of the pair requirements please do so. The Committee gave Hal Koontz the ability to deal with each request on an individual basis. Please keep in mind the the requirement for the more common finches not already excluded from the program is still set at 5 pairs.

Dear prospective participant in Finchsave:

The National Finch and Softbill Society has established a specialization breeding program named "Finchsave". It will begin operating in the calendar year 1988. During the fall of 1987, Finchsave is taking applications for participation in the program so participants will be ready when the program officially begins.

The purpose for Finchsave is to establish finch and softbill species now while they are available to insure a supply of these birds in the future should importation of birds be cut off. Unfortunately, most aviculturalists are collectors, not serious breeders. Most aviculturalists acquire a pair of one species here and a pair of another species there and over a period of time collect a variety of birds. The aviculturalist may tire of certain species and try new ones. There is nothing wrong with this for a person new to the bird fancy. Everyone needs experimentation to discover what types of birds he is really interested in. But after a few years of experience, the aviculturalist should give something back to aviculture by consistently breeding a particular species.

Most of the African waxbills which are so cheap today are not being bred in very large numbers in the United States. Most of the African waxbills we see were wild caught and imported. Those that are raised in the United States do not come anywhere near meeting the demand for them. The same is true for most of the finch species and nearly all of the softbilled species.

Specialization has several benefits. First, the aviculturalist will have multiple pairs of birds in the species. If a bird dies or is incompatible with its mate or is a poor performer, the aviculturalist will have other birds to switch around. This will save a lot of time. With one pair of birds in a species, if one birds dies, breeding cannot continue. It is often quite difficult to find the mdd bird to recreate a pair and even if found, it often takes months to get a newly purchased bird to settle down and feel confortable in the new environment. Switching a bird that is already used to the aviculturalist, the diet and the environment may take it only a week or two before it is ready to breed. Second, the aviculturalist will learn and understand the special needs of the species which will increase breeding results. Third, the aviculturalist will have a number of different bloodlines. This will mean not having to get new blood as often which always carries with it the risk of bringing in a disease or parasite problem. Specialization will cause more birds to be bred which will belp American aviculture.

The goal of Finchsave is to establish and maintain all finch and

softbill species in American aviculture. We hope to achieve this by encouraging serious finch and softbill breeders to join Finchsave as participants. A participant is expected to focus his or her attention and energy on one or more specific species of finches or softbills in order to attempt to raise 25 chicks or more per year for a minimum of five years. We are requiring our participants to make a five year commitment to the program. While 25 chicks per year is our goal, we do not expect every participant to raise 25 chicks in each of the five years. Some years will be better than other years and it is likely that a down year will result in less than 25 chicks being reared in those years. We are, however, looking for consistency in breeding programs. The five-year goal of the program for each participant is 100 chicks. A participant can remain involved in the program beyond the five year commitment period. Finchsave recommends that its participants work with a species for a period of ten years, if possible. The 100 chick qual can be met in any 5 consecutive year period and is not limited to the first 5 years the participant is involved in the program. As is explained in the Rules, some species will have lower goals.

We do not necessarily encourage our participants to limit their breeding programs to the one or more species on which they are concentrating. It is perfectly acceptable to have a general collection of finches and other birds in addition. We do, however, encourage finch and softbill breeders to select at least one species which the breeder particularly likes and is willing to help establish in American aviculture. This is an excellent way for breeders to make a contribution to aviculture.

Enclosed with this letter is a copy of the Finchsave program rules. Please read it to learn in greater detail the items discussed in this letter.

Pinchsave will send out a form each December or January, asking you certain information about your breeding results for the preceding year. We require that our participants band their chicks so that record keeping is possible. Since many species are very shy and may abandon young if the young are banded in the nest, it is acceptable to band chicks with larger bands after they fledge or at weaning age. The information we desire on the form for the particular species in guestion will include but not be limited to (1) the number of chicks reared to independence from parents, (2) the number of birds that have died,

- (3) the number of birds that have been sold or otherwise disposed of,
- (4) the number of birds that have been bought or otherwise acquired and
- (5) specified husbandry practices. We may also request a copy of the participant's inventory for the species listing the birds' band num-

bers, dates of hatch and identity of the hirds' parents.

Finchsave is organized with a Species Captain for each species and a Group Manager for a large number of species (waxhills, for example). The participant's primary contact will be with the Species Captain whose main joh is to manage the species. The Species Captain will know what all the participants concentrating on his or her particular species are doing and will assist participants (if needed) in acquiring their initial breeding stock, in acquiring new bloodlines and in disposing of surplus stock. We recommend that the participants check with the Species Captain before selling surplus stock. In some instances we may require participants to sell surplus stock to persons who are participants concentrating on that particular species. This would be true in some of the rarer species.

Our goal is to further aviculture and we wish Pinchsave participants to enjoy their participation and not be discouraged by rules and excessive paperwork. We hope that the participants will recognize that some rules are desirable and necessary and for the good of the species.

We will give recognition in the NFS Bulletin to those participants who meet their breeding goals. In addition, if a participant's surplus birds are not needed by any other participant in Finchsave, the NFS Bulletin will provide free advertising space to help participants sell their hirds. One of our goals in Finchsave is to generate from participants excellent articles for the Bulletin. If a participant has writing ability, we hope that he or she will willingly write an occasional article for the Bulletin, especially if asked to do so by Finchsave.

We hope that you will join Finchsave and attempt to consistently hreed a finch or softhill species. To join Finchsave, please write to Hal M. Koontz, 2604 Auburn Court, Bakersfield, CA 93306 for a Finchsave Application and Participation Agreement. Please state the name of the species with which you wish to participate. Upon receipt of your application, your eligibility will be verified and you will be contacted shortly thereafter by your Species Captain.

Finchsave is in need of Species Captains and Group Managers. If, after reading the description of the duties of these positions in the Rules of the Finchsave Program, you are interested in either position, please contact me. We think we have set up a good program, but we welcome your ideas on how to improve it. We will make modifications to the program after it has been in operation for a year. We hope that you will join us in this exciting new program.

RULES OF THE FINCHSAVE PROGRAM

The following rules for the Finchsave program have been adopted by the Finchsave Committee:

- 1. The Finchsave program is an official program of the National Finch and Softbill Society (MFS).
- 2. All finches and softhilled birds will be included in the program except for species that the Committee believes are well established. At this time, only zebra finches, lady gouldian finches, society finches (bengalese), java sparrows and mixed-blood shafttails are being excluded. Pure longtails and pure hecks will be included in the program.
- 3. There will be a one-time #5.00 per species charge to participate in the program.
- 4. Banding of birds in the program will be required. Any closed coded band is acceptable. Use of an NFS band is highly recommended, but it is not required. Chicks do not need to be banded in the nest as long as they are banded shortly after they fledge. Birds banded with an NFS band larger than the size recognized by NFS for the species may not be shown in the young bird class of NFS shows. Unbanded adult birds which come into the program must be banded at that time with larger size closed bands or numbered split plastic bands. Any identifiable or coded band will be acceptable.
- 5. Colony breeding is acceptable, but should be avoided whenever possible because of the difficulty of keeping track of the bloodlines of the chicks. Participants who colony breed must pay close attention to which birds are the parents of the chicks and keep an accurate record of this information.
 - 6. The structure of Finchsave will be as follows:
- a. Program Director In charge of administering the program and answering minor issues as they arise.
- b. Finchsave Committee Responsible for advising the Program Director on issues whenever requested and to set policy for the Finchsave program. The only policy issues which will not be decided by the Committee are those dealing with financial matters and policies having an impact on MFS as an organization. These issues must be decided by the MFS Board of Directors.

- c. Group Managers Responsible for supervising all the Species Captains in the Group Manager's group of birds and, if no Species Captain is appointed for a particular species, responsible for acting as the Species Captain for that species. There will be seven Group Managers responsible for the following groups of birds:
- (1) Australian and parrot finches excluding the Australian mannikins and the Sydney waxbill.
 - (2) All waxbills.
 - (3) All mannikins.
- (4) All African finches excluding the African mannikins and African waxbills.
 - (5) All European finches.
 - (6) All South American finches.
 - (7) All softbilled birds.
- d. Species Captains responsible for gathering information from participants, getting birds into participants' hands, monitoring bloodlines, communicating with participants and assisting participants in any problem they may have. A Species Captain will use his discretion in placing birds and may do so in an apparently discriminatory way, if he believes it is in the best interest of the species. In short, the Species Captain is responsible for managing the species in the United States.
- e. Participants responsible for raising 25 cbicks per year of the species (normally, see goals below), filing annual reports and for complying with the other rules of the program.
- 7. Annual reports on a calendar year basis will be required from all participants. Reports will be due on January 31 of the year after the year in question. The Program Director will send a letter to delinquent participants on March 1 of the year after the year in question. Except for unusual circumstances, in the discretion of the Program Director, participants will be removed from the Finchsave program if reports are not received prior to March 20 of the year after the year in question.
- 8. Participants will be advised when they apply to participate that their mames and telephone numbers will be disclosed to other participants working on the same species unless the applicant notifies

Finchsave at the time of applying that the applicant does not want his or her identity disclosed. In such a case, no recognition for achievement will be given to said participant without permission from the participant but the information from the annual report will be used anonymously.

- The goals of the participants and some of the requirements will be as follows:
- a. Unless otherwise stated, the annual goal of participants in all species will be to raise 25 chicks in the participant's species per year. A baby will be considered to be raised in a particular year if it is banded in that year and either is alive on December 31 of that year or lives to 2 months of age. If this goal is met, the participant's name will be published in the NFS Bulletin as having met the annual goal for the species. The long-range goal of participants is to raise 100 chicks in the participant's species in a 5 consecutive year period. The 5 consecutive years do not need to be the first 5 years that the participant is involved in the program. Instead, said period can be any 5 consecutive years. If this goal is net and the participant writes an article or fills out a questionnaire so that the editor of the Bulletin can write an article for the participant, the participant will receive an attractive certificate suitable for framing and additional recognition in the Bulletin. All participants will be entitled to free advertising space in the Bulletin to advertise surplus birds in the participant's species not needed by the Finchsave program. Participants will be required to enter the program with a minimum of 5 pairs of birds in the participant's species, with 8 pairs being the recommended number of pairs to begin with, if possible.
- b. The Finchsave Director will designate certain higher priced birds to be in a category with lesser requirements and goals. These species will be designated as the need arises. The initial criteria for the designation of these birds is cost in excess of \$200.00 per pair. The criteria may be changed at any time by the Finchsave Committee and may result in certain species being recategorized. Initially, Participants in these species will be required to start with a minimum of 3 pairs of birds. The goals for these species will be reduced to 15 chicks annually and 60 chicks in a 5 consecutive year period. If a species is recategorized and the goals for the species are changed, participants who joined the program for the species before the change occurred may continue in the program with the same goals as when the participant originally joined.
- c. There may be certain extremely rare species where it is not possible to obtain 3 pairs of birds. For these species, the

minimum number of pairs and the goals will be set by the Finchsave Director as the need arises.

- d. A participant who qualifies for the 5 consecutive year award must write to the Finchsave Director and apply for it. The results will he verified by the Finchsave Director or the Species Captain.
- 10. A participant may participate in more than 1 species at a time. A participant will devote as much time and energy to the program as is necessary to meet the goals of the program.
- 11. Surplus birds of participants in the program must be made available to other participants in the program if requested by the Species Captain or the Finchsave Director. If no such request is made, participants shall be free to sell their surplus birds outside of the Finchsave program, although participants are encouraged (but it is not required) to let their Species Captains know that they have birds for sale. If a request is made by the Species Captain or the Finchsave Director that participants sell their birds to other participants in the program, a participant must give written notice of the availability of the surplus birds for sale to the Species Captain and the Finchsave Director. Said notice must describe the birds' sex, if known, age and price. Price will he set by the seller. Nevertheless, participants must ask a fair price. If neither the Species Captain, the Finchsave Director nor any other participant in that species has contacted the seller within two months after the seller has given said notice, or, even if contacted, it does not appear by said two-month date that a sale of the surplus birds is then likely, the seller shall he free to sell the surplus birds outside of the Finchsave program. Birds for sale through the Species Captain or to another participant in the Finchsave program must be accurately described by the seller by pointing out whether the birds are over 18 months of age and whether they have any known defect.
- 12. Species Captains must be participants in the species over which they are the captain. Each Group Manager, the Finchsave Director and each member of the Finchsave Committee must be a participant in at least one species.
- 13. If a participant changes his or her address or telephone number or determines that he or she can no longer participate in the Finchsave program or continue with the species agreed upon, the participant must notify the Species Captain and the Finchsave Director in writing immediately thereafter.

- 14. If a participant does not timely return the annual report or comply with these rules after having received a warning, the Finchsave Director may, with the consent of the Finchsave Committee, remove the participant from the Finchsave program.
- 15. The Finchsave Committee may amend these rules at any time without the consent of the participants. Any changes in the Finchsave program rules will be communicated to the participants, either by letter or through the NFS Bulletin. It is anticipated that certain changes to these rules will be necessary after Finchsave's first year of operation and from time to time thereafter. Participants are encouraged to recommend improvements to the program. Participants should keep in mind the program's competing need to not be burdensome on the participants (thereby encouraging participation) and yet achieve the program's goals and obtain the needed information to make the program successful and of value to aviculture.
- 16. No person may be a participant in the Finchsave program unless he or she is a member of the National Finch and Softhill Society. The Finchsave Director shall verify membership in NFS before admitting any person as a participant. If a participant ceases to be a member of NFS, said individual shall cease to be a participant in the Finchsave program unless said individual reestablishes membership in NFS within 60 days of Finchsave's letter to him or her advising said individual that he or she will he removed as a participant if he or she does not reestablish membership within said 60 day period.
- 17. The National Finch and Softbill Society, the Finchsave Director, the Group Managers and the Species Captains will not have any liability to participants arising out of any transaction or communication with respect to the program. For example, in a sale of hirds hetween participants, said persons will not he liable even if they were responsible for buyer and seller discovering each other and even if they repeated a misrepresentation or false statement about the quality of the birds heing sold or about some other aspect of the transaction.
- 18. Decisions of the Species Captains and Group Managers may he appealed to the Finchsave Director. Decisions of the Finchsave Director may be appealed to the Finchsave Committee. All appeals are to be made in writing. In the case of an appeal to the Finchsave Director, the appeal should be addressed to 2604 Auburn Court, Bakersfield, CA 93306. In the case of an appeal to the Finchsave Committee, the appeal should be addressed to the home office of NFS.

PINCHSAVE APPLICATION AND PARTICIPATION AGREEMENT

This Agreement is entered into by and between the undersigned (hereafter referred to as "Participant") and the Pinchsave program, a specialization breeding program of the National Pinch and Softhill Society (hereafter referred to as "the program").

Participant represents that Participant believes himself/ herself to have sufficient experience hreeding finches/softhills to successfully participate in the program, and

Participant represents that he/she has the hreeding facility to hreed at least five pair of the species designated below (hereafter referred to as "the species"), and

Participant represents that he/she has at least five pair of the species and will attempt to raise at least 25 chicks of the species each year for at least the next five years, and

Participant represents that he/she has a copy of the Rules of the Pinchsave Program and has read them, and

Participant represents that he/she is a member of the National Finch and Softhill Society.

The undersigned herehy applies to become a participant in the program for the species and, if accepted, agrees to comply with the Rules of the Finchsave Program, specifically including the following rules:

- 1. Participant will devote as much time and energy to the program as is necessary to meet the goals of the program.
- Participant will complete and return each year's annual report (questionnaire) by January 31 for the previous year of participation ending on December 31.
- 3. Participant will first offer to sell surplus stock through the Species Captain if requested by the Species Captain or the Director of the program.
- 4. If Participant changes his/her address or telephone number or determines that he/she can no longer participate in Finchsave or continue with the species, he/she will notify the Species Captain and the Pinchsave Director in writing immediately thereafter.
- 5. If Participant does not timely return the questionnaire or comply with Pinchsave rules, Pinchsave may, at Pinchsave's discretion, drop Participant from the program.

- 6. Birds for sale through the Species Captain or to another participant in Finchsave shall be accurately described by Participant by pointing out the age of the birds, the sex, if known, and whether the birds have any known defect.
- 7. If Participant does not want his/her name and telephone number disclosed to the other participants working on the same species nor recognition for meeting the program's goals, Participant shall notify the Director of the program of this fact in writing at the time that this Agreement is returned to the Director. Failure to so notify the Director shall mean that the program may disclose said information to others in the discretion of the program. The program will make every attempt to maintain privacy if requested by the Participant.
- 8. Participant agrees that the National Finch and Softbill Society, the Finchsave Director, the Group Managers and the Species Captains will not have any liability to Participant arising out of any transaction or communication with respect to the program. Participant releases said individuals from liability even if they make a false statement about the quality of a bird offered for sale or fail to maintain privacy when requested to do so.
- 9. Participant will close band all chicks raised under the program in accordance with the rules of the Finchsave program.
- 10. If the program requests the Participant to write an article on the species, the Participant agrees to either write an article on the species or fill out a detailed questionnaire so the editor of the NFS Bulletin can prepare an article from the answers to the questionnaire.

In order for the Director to determine whether the Participant qualifies to participate in the program and to help the Species Captain understand how the Participant intends to breed the species, the Participant agrees to fill out the attached questionnaire and send it to the Director with this Agreement.

Participant represents that all of the information in the questionnaire is correct and encloses the M5.00 application fee with this Agreement. (Please make checks out to "NFS".)
