

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

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

In October Congress enacted legislation aimed at halting the trade in wild-caught birds. President Bush signed the legislation on October 23, 1992. The new law immediately banned imports of the ten most threatened bird species. These birds (ail psittacine) have been imported in numbers thought to be a threat to survival of the species.

A year from now, all birds listed under the convention on International Trade in endangered species of wild flora and Fauna (CITES) will be banned from import unless placed on an "approved" list established by the Secretary of the Interior after a determination that trade is not detrimental to the species and that strict conservation measures are being taken. The new law sets a major precedent by shifting the burden of proof to importers, who must show that trade in a particular species is sustainable. All species not listed under CITES can continue to be imported unless the secretary determines that trade is threatening the species.

To keep importers from making a run on birds during the one year waiting period, import levels of species cannot exceed those of the most recent year from which there are import data. The Secretary may also suspend trade or set import quotas for any species found to be endangered by trade or for which the country of origin has failed to develop a management program that ensures the birds' conservation and humane treatment.

Some 8 million birds are captured annually for the pet trade worldwide. With habitat destruction n and other factors, this has brought more than 1,000 species to the verge of extinction, including more than 20 percent of the world's parrots, the most popular pet bird.

The airlines that have adopted policies against transporting wild-caught birds have increased to 85.

The complete text of the Notice in the <u>Federal Register</u> is reprinted elsewhere in this issue, with a list of the common names of the affected finch species.

Wild Bird Conservation Act (Act) of 1992; Immediate Prohibition on the import of Certain Species of Exotic Birds to the United States, et al.

In the matter of immediate implementation of an importation quota for all CITES species of exotic birds: One-year delay in the total prohibition of the importation of all species of exotic birds to the United States listed in the Appendices to the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Flora and Fauna; Request for information on exotic bird conservation programs.

AGENCY: Fish and Wildlife Service. Interior.

ACTION: Notice.

SUMMARY: Immediate Prohibition: Effective immediately, the Wild Bird Conservetion Act establishes a moretorium on the importation of ten species of exotic birds listed in the Appendices to the Convention on international Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flore (CITES). Importation Quotas: The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) is notifying the public that for any species for bird listed in the Appendices to CITES, there is an importation quots on the maximum number that can be imported into the United States during the year October 23, 1992-October 22, 1993.

One Year Delay in Total Prohibition: The Service is notifying the public that after a one-year delay, the importation of all species of exotic birds (as defined by the Act) listed in any Appendices to CITES is prohibited unless than species is listed in an approved list. Request for Information: The Wild Bird Conservation Act of 1992 directs tha Secretary to call for information on the exotic bird conservation programs of each country that exports exotic birds; the Service is hereby requesting that information. Notice of Intent: The Service is notifying the public of its intent to promulgate regulations to carry out the purposes of the Act.

DATES: The moratorium on imports of the prohibited species and the importation quotas are effective October 23: 1992. The end of the one-year delay period and subsequent prohibition on imports of species of birds listed in the CITES Appendices will be effective October 22. 1993. Comments on conservation programs in bird exporting countries are requested on or before January 10: 1993: Harch 1, 1993, ADDRESSES: Comments end information should be sent to: Director, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, c/o Office of Management Authority, 4401 N. SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION: On October 23, 1992, the President signed into law the Wild Bird Conservation Act of 1992 (Act), the purposes of which include promoting the conservation of exotic birds by: ensuring that ell imports into the United States of species of exotic birds are biologically sustainable and not detrimental to the species; ensuring that imported birds are not subject to inhumene treatment; and assisting wild bird conservation and management programs in countries of origin.

A. Immediate Prohibition

Pursuant to Section 105 of the Act ("Moratoria on Imports of Exotic Birds Covered by Convention"), effective immediately the importation of any exotic bird species identified as a Category B species by the eighth meeting of the Conference of the Perties to CITES is prohibited. A Category B species is defined by the Conference of the Parties to CITES as a heavily traded Appendix II species for which "current international trade levels are probably streat to the survival of the taxon e global basis" (although two have since been transferred to Appendix I). Those

species are as follows (Scientific names are official, while common names are for the convenience of the public and may have local variations): Aggrerius fischeri (Fischer's lovebird), Amazona oratrix (synonym; Amazona ochrocephala gratrixi (Double veilawheaded amazon). Amazona viridigenalis (Green-cheeked amazon), Aratinga auricapilla (Golden-capped conure), Brotogens pyrrhopterus (Grey-cheeked parakeet), Cocatua uiba (White cockatoo), Cacatua goffini (Goffin's cockatoo). Cacatua naemotropygia (Redvented cockatoo). Cacataa suiphurea (Lesser sulphur-crested cochatoc), and Lorius garmius (Chattering lory).

B. Importetion Quotas

Pursuant to Section 105 of the Act ("Moratorie on Imports of Exotic Birds Covered By Convention"), and effective immediately, an importation quota is implemented for ell species of exotic birds listed in any Appendices to CITES. As defined by the Act, the term exotic bird means "eny live or dead member of the class Aves that is not indigenous to the 50 States or the District of Columbia, including any eng or offspring thereof, and does not

include: Domestic poultry, deed sporthunted birds, dead museum specimens. dead scientific specimens, or products manufactured from such birds; or birds in the following families: Phasianidae. Hamididas, Cracidas, Meleagrididas, -iegapoutidas, Anatidas, Struthionidas. - Descare, Drometinae, and Gruidae. The act require that for each species, this quote is equal to the number of that species that was imported during the must recent year for which the Secretary has complete import data. The roi era woled bateil saluup nollatroquii: CITES Appendix i, il and III species, whose importetion is also covered by the provisions of 50 CFR part 23. The Service is utilizing 1991 import statistics in this determination. Once his importation quote has been reached for a species, further importation will be probabiled. Pursuant to Section 105 of the Act, the importation quotes are independent of whether a shipment is

for primarily commercial or noncommercial purposes, and is independent of whether specimens are wild-caught, born in captivity, or bred in captivity. If a species listed the CITES Appendices was not imported into the United States in 1991, based on Fish and Wildlife Service import statistics, it is subject to a zero quota. Except for those bird families exempted from the provisions of the Act, and species indigenous to the 50 United Stages, if a CITES-listed bird species is not in the ioliowing list it is subject to a zero quota and its importation into the United States is prohibited (unless accompanied by a permit pursuant to regulations to be promiseted; see Notice of Intent, below).

The following is a list of CITES exotic bird species (es defined by the Act) and the importation quota for the one-year period beginning October 23, 1992 and ending Cictober 22, 1993. Scientific names of these bird species are listed taxonomically by Order and Family: for the convenience of the public, common manuse for these species are available from the Service's Office of Management Authority at the aformentioned address.

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
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Note 1: CITES-listed species in the following lamilies are not included in the above list, as they are exempt from the provinces of the Act: Phasianidae, included. Cracidae, Meleagrididae, feganodiidae. Anetidae, Sturthionidae, Pheider and Gruidae. CITES-listed species indigenous to the 50 United States and the District of Columbia are not included in the above list, as they are exempt from the provisions of the Act.

Note 5: The March 1992 CITES Conference of the Parties adopted new standard comenciature for birds. The Service is unswere of any potential discrepancies: however, the scienting names in the above list are considered synonymous with the newly adopted CITES official scientific names in the case of any differences.

C. One Year Delay of Implementation

Pursuant to section 105 ("Moratoria on Imports of Exotic Birds Covered by Convention") and section 106 ("List of Approved Species") of the Act, effectiv Cotober 22, 1993, the importation into the United States of any species of exotic bird listed in the Appendices to CITES is prohibited, unless that specie is placed on a list of approved species published in the Federal Register. The only species that will not be covered by this moratorium would be those approved species being imported from approved countries or qualifying breeding facilities.

D. Request for Information

Pursuant to the section 109 of the Ac ("Call for Information"), the Service calls for information on the exotic bird conservation program of each country that exports exotic birds (whether ranger non-range states). This information could include population status, harves

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

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FINCHSAVE REPORT NOVEMBER 1992 by the FINCHSAVE Director. Linda Oia

A sed note is the death of Dr. Yel Cleer in August, Although I never had the pleasure of meeting him, we exchanged correspondence concerning the FINCHSAVE program. He expressed continued interest in the program and his encouragement means even more to me now. He touched many lives and will be sorely missed.

As of early Novembar we have 25 participents, 42 different species and about 482 birds in the program. An abbreviated breakdown is as follows:

- 1. Australian/Parrot Finches 5 species.
- 2. Maxbills 12 species.
- 3. Mannikins 5 species.

- 5. Europeans 1 species.
 - South Americans 2 species.
- 4. Africans 12 species. Softbilla - 5 species. 7.

FINCHSAVE "Job Descriptions". We are still working on putting together a FINCHSAVE Committee who will help set policy and assist the Director in decisions. Staphan Hoppin has agreed to be on the Committae along with Brenda Geesey. I am still recruiting other members. If you are interested let me know. Committee members must be FINCHSAVE participants. Group Managers will keep in touch with Species Capteins in their group and assist them as neaded. Thay will keep communications going to and from the Director. They should have knowledge or experience with several of the species in their group and should be willing to fill in where there are no Species Captains. If not experienced with a particular species thay will refer the participant to someone who is. Species Captains will assist participants by providing species information. assist in locating birds for new bloodlines, assist in selling chicks that participants produce if they need assistence, help with any areas of particular difficulty, i.e. banding, racord keeping, faeding, and general management. Species Captains can saak assistance from Group Managers and the Director as nnedad.

I can make available "apacies pages", information on bending, racord keeping, feeding, fostering, management and braeding from my FINCH FDRUM Name letter. Group Managers and Species Captains - let ma know what you need. Also, collect magazine articles on species which may be helpful to people in the program. Magazines are more likely to have updeted information as books quickly become outdated. I've often sent copies of articles to help people understand their species better. Check the NFS Bullatin Index in the January/February issue each year. AFA Watchbird February/Merch 1992 factures Finchas and October/November 1992 features Softbills. Both have excellent articlas and photos. Use the MFS Annual Census to help you to find people who sre knowledgeable about a species. Participants - your job is to breed your

birda! Ask for help if you need it. If you have trouble mith banding, or any other issue, aak for edvico. Comault your Species Ceptoin, Group Manager or me. Information is available end we want to keep communication going both ways. Often information about feiloree ie ea educational as that ebout successes so pleese be willing to keep telking to other participants ebout what does ark and what doesn't. If you lose some birds and no longer have the minimum pair requirement, don't arry - be happy! We mon't kick you out of the program. We'll help you find replacements.

LET ME CLEAR UP A MUCH MISUNGERSTOOD POINT !

all the chicks reised in the FINCHSAVE Progrem ere the sole property of the participant who raises them - of course! We encourage you to sell or trade with other participants in the FINCHSAVE Progrem as your first priority but you are under no obligation to do so. We can try to help you find a market for these birds but you will probably not be able to make a big business out of thia. So far we have not had any reports of participants being overrun with offspring. NFS will advertise these birds for you in the Bulletin Clessified Ada free of cost.

WHO SANG WHILE ROME BURNED?

A question which naturally brings up the well-known Roman poet, Catullus. Well, everybody knew him circa 60 B.C. as a man-about-town. A gentleman of Verona, Gaius Valerius Catullus was a sort of early version of Robert Burns. While Burns died at 37, from a fever exacerbated by drink and wild women, Catullus managed to burn himself out at age 30! He was on borrowed time anyway, for he was known for writing obscene political lampoons against Caesar. Burns wrote similar stuff in his day. Catullus, like Burns, also wrote some passionate love lyrics to his girlfriends, many of whom were high-society, married ladies, as were some of Burns' paramours. You should read some of this stuff!

In his short but happy life, Catullus had a passionate fondness for a certain beautiful Roman matron, 10 years his senior, and wrote a couple of poems about her and her pet bird. In one, he expresses jealousy of her bissing the bird and hugging it to her bosom. In the second poem, "Lesbia's lears", he becates death for taking the bird and causing his friend to wear a sad and tearful face. He is really only miffed because this interferes with his love-life, and he doesn't actually care about the bird itself.


Translating ocems into a foreign language is probably about the most difficult writing task there is, next to editing this magazine! That's why Burns, for example, is better known in the (ex) Soviet Union than in the (current) United States. (Is California still with us?) A canary is mentioned twice in the first poem above. In the second, only a "little bird" is mentioned, presumably the same bird. The word "canary" was not necessary for rhyming purposes in English, so perhaps it was a translation for "Seria".

The Romans, like the present-day Italians, were keen on songbirds, both for listening to and eating! At home, they had the usual European favorites, like the Goldfinch, while a variety of Serins would have been available from their N. African provinces. (The name Africa originally applied to the province around Carthage, now in Tunisia.)

It would be interesting to see cages from the era. Does anyone know if any survived? Or perhaps they used the system known later in northwest Europe; that of tying song birds to a perch with a long thread attached to its foot. The Pomans used this method for anchoring their Latin-speaking parrots, except they would have used light chains.

So when Nero fiddled as Rome burned, we will just have to guess which of the songbirds began to sing in competition with him.

Leg banding Procedure courtesy of the NATIONAL FINCH 80CLETY



The most important thing to remember when banding chicks is to do it over a counter or table so if the chick is dropped it doesn't fall to the floor. The age to band varies between apecies but is generally between 5 and 10 days. You can tell by looking at the ankle joint (the joint where the toes come together) and the size of the band.



Have the bands, a toothpick (or other small blunt instrument) and some lubricant ready. Be sure you have the bands "right side up" for easier reading.



The band is generally placed on the birds' right leg. Banding just before the parents go to roost in the eveing will prevent them from picking at the band. By the next morning they will have forgotten about it.



Hold the chick firmly but in such a way as to not cut off its' breathing and so that you don't harm it. Remember, their bodies cannot tolerate compression. Put a little bit of lubricant on the chicks' foot and slide the band over the three front toes and finally over the ankle joint. The back toe will probably have to be gently pried out from under the band with a toothpick. The band now should be in the proper location between the ankle and the elbow joints.



Check on the chick the next few days to be sure that the band has not slipped off and that there are no scrapea or irritations on the foot or leg.

- The Apprentice must eppear before the Board, (or submit e <u>noterized</u> statement) indicating she/he understands and agrees to the following:
 - a. When requested to write a report, it must be done immediately. (Exemple - the three reports of shows to be judged.)
 - b. All show reports must be in within two weeks.
 - c. All judges must respond to sil inquiries and must perticipete on Stenderd committeee.
 - d. MFS Penel Judgee muet adhere to all MFS Judges rulee and must judge by current MFS Stenderde.

RAMBLINGS FROM A BIRD PERSON

My Spice Finch is feeding 4 Gold-breasted chicks, that is, when he is not feeding the semile European Gold Finch or ushering a Fire Finch chick or guarding some other bird who is under the weather.

Speaking of semile birds, i'd like to hear from others with a geriatric flock. I've got a Lavender with cataracts so bad they can be seen from across the room. He sure is easy to catch. I moved some things and had to put them back so he wouldn't crash into the wall. He knows where the food is however. How long do finches live anyhow, 10, 15 years? Do all old birds get bald head/necks?

Yes, Les Gibson, I do have Blue-naped Mousebirds. Thanks to a leg band accident the hen now has one leg, but the cock only had one good wing. I have been contemplating handicapped ramps but so far she is doing better than he is. I had a talk with them to advise that the male isn't supposed to sit on eggs, he just gave me a strange look and continued to sit. The changing of the guard is quick. The switch is very quick, I don't think the eggs ever sees light in the switch. When she hurt her leg they had a fertile egg. The Diamond Bove hatched it but proceeded to throw it out as an obviously defective Dove chick. I tried to raise it but no luck. Back to the International Scientific Survey. The male has a more red eye patch, his blue patch is bluer and his call is stronger. The hen is heavier bodied. The mousebirds are free with all the finches and bother no one. They don't even strike at finch chicks who land on or near them. I would certainly like to have some more Mousebirds. Perhaps a consortium could be formed

I have a breeding pair of Gold-breasted Waxbills. I just let them do their thing. They do not like their nest disturbed and will abandon it if disturbed. They breed like Zebra finches once they get it figured out. The Gold-breasted were 3 to 4 years old before they started breeding.

In response to Martha Wigmore's question. Any softbill large enough so that it cannot get it's head through the wire would appreciate the length but not the height. I would not keep more than one pair of large softbills in the cage. Softbills can become aggressive quickly and do fatal harm in breeding season. Don't be conservative in the first softbills, get something with color or song. My experience shows they are forgiving in diet as long as it is not a specialized diet requiring nectars or exotic egg mixes. There are some very good pelletized diets which, with fruits, vegetable and protein supplements are great. Suggestions; toucans, acarias, thrushes, orioles, starlings, mynahs.
