### NFSS 4th Qtr 1995 Board Meeting

# Held: New Orleans, LA recorded 11/16/95

Directors present: Stephen Hoppin, Miki Sparzak, Dr. Al Decoteau, Lynda Bakula, Dalc laird, Elicen Laird, Gene Miller, and Jerry McCawley. A quorum was reached, (since NFSS still operated under the old bylaws) so all issues voted upon will become valid.

#### Reports

Treasurer: Miki called for a freeze on additional spending until March 1, 1996. The checking account balance was \$1,624.78. The savings account balance was \$1,537.83. giving NDSS a net worth of \$3.162.61 as of 11/16/95.

Membership: Lynda reported a total of 853 members with 90 new members.

Finchsave: Linda Oja was not present, so Stephen Hoppin gave her report as sent. A total of 58 members with 52 species present were reported. The waxbill survey returned 79 forms, reporting 759 fluches in the waxbill group.

Bands: Eileen Laird reported that 473 orders had been filled to date. The color for 1996 will be orange.

Finchshop: No report

Advertising: Lynda Bakula reported that advertising is status quo.

Education: No report

Standards: Dr. Al Decoteau reported that Star Finch proposal was published. There was no report on the mynah standard. Al asked for a committee on the Pintail Nonparcil.

Judge Panel: Dr. Al Decoteau reported that NFSS has two people in the NFSS apprentice program. They are Jerry McCawley and Chris Voronovitch. Two judges tests were scheduled to be taken at the National Bird Show.

Awards: Ginny Allen was not present. so Stephen Hoppin reported that 77 clubs are affliated with NFSS. There was no reason to believe that affliation fees will have to raised in 1996.

Conservation Committe: There was no report. Due to lack of interest the Conservation Committee was terminated.

Betty Crocker Project: Miki reported that many coupons have been received. NFSS will be able to secure free gifts to be used at the raffles, soon.

Breeder Recognition Awards Committee: Jerry McCawley reported that the BRP is ready to go as presented at the board meeting.

Overseas Award Patronage: Tom Rood did his as usual excellent job of securing a wide variety of awards to be given at the National Cage Bird Show.

Display Boards: Miki Sparzak reported that the lost display boards have been found. At the close of the AFA convention, the hotel was to send the display boards back to Baltimore, MD, via UPS, to Miki Sparzak. Instead the hotel sent them to California. After many discussions the boards were located and the hotel agreed to send them back.

AFA Update: Jerry McCawley gave a repoon the latest going ons with AFA and legislature. NFSS will affliate with AFA at the highest level.

#### **Old Business**

Judges Selection: The board voted on the selection of judges for the Kaytee Great American Bird Show, to be held in Sarasota, FL and and Manchester, CT. The results were to be announced at another time. A discussion was enacted and a vote was taken to decide if NFSS should pay 100% of the judges fees, to be able to select their choices of judges. A motion was passed to allow NFSS to select the judges for GABS, by paying 100% of judges fees, 7 For, 1 Against.

AFA Delegates: A motion was made and passed to appoint Jerry McCawley and Miki Sparzak as AFA delegates.

#### **New Business**

Finch and Canary World: A discussion was held to determine if NFSS should exchange ads with the Finch and Canary World magazine. It was decided to keep the money sent for an ad and not exchange ads.

Appointment of Editor: Two persons requsting the position of editor were reviewed. Samples of work were reviewed. The vote was: Kenneth Tidwell 1. Robert Petrie 11. The 11 votes reflects 6 mailed-in and 2 abstained. A discussion was held on the "editors equipment" will go to Robert Petrie.

Proposed By-laws Revision: The votes were counted and results reported as follows. There 47 votes to approve the new by-laws nad I vote against. The New By-laws were approved.

Election Results: It was decided that Nancy Reed would continue to count the votes for the NFSS election.

Judges Testing Procedure: Dr. Al Decoteau discussed the procedure for becoming an NFSS judge. It was decided that no input was needed from others as to how the apprentice program is handled.

American PureBred Registry: A short discussion was held and suprisingly everyone felt the whole thig was a big joke.

Judges Must Show Birds: A discussion was held about the enactment of a rule that would state that an NFSS judge must show birds in the finch and softbill division in order to continue to meet judging requirements. Further discussion will be brought up at at future meetings.

Secretary Books: A discussion was held as to adopt a set of secretary books to be passed on from one administration to another, to insure everyone knows about actions from the past.

Editors Fee: It was decided, in order for the editor to be eligible for the \$200 fee, the Bulletin must be postmarked to the Tresurer by the 1st day of the second month of a Bulletin period, ie.: Jan/Feb issue must be postmarked by Feb 1st, when received by the Tresurer, to receive the editors fee, unless prior approval has been made.

Board Meetings by Mail: A committee is to formed to insure enough time is allotted for discussion, before any matter is voted upon.

Job Description: A job description is to be written for each department, so each chairman knows exactly what is expected.

Membership Drive: It was suggested that an all out membership drive be started to in crease the the NFSS membership.

Band Secretary's Report: Eileen Laird reported that 473 band orders were filled, totaling 32,000 + bands sold in 1995. The band color for 1996 will be orange.

Judges Panel Report: Dr. Decoteau announce four new apprentices to the Judges Panel. They are: Jerry McCawley, Christine Voronovitch. Armando Lee, and Frank Hudson. There appeared to be two birds reaching championship status in 1995. Results were not in yet. The Star Finch standard has been published. No report was available on the mynah standard. Volunteers were needed for the Pintail Nonpareil standard committee.

Membership Chairman's Report: Lynda Bakula reported that there was a total of 90 new members for 1995, making a total of 853 members.

FinchSave Report: Stephen Hoppin gave the report. There are currently 58 FinchSave members with 52 species represented. The results of the Waxbill Survey are in. 79 forms were returned, representing 759 individual finches.

Awards Report: Awards were presented to individuals for their 1994 achievements. An exhibitor of excellence plaque was present to Dennis Burhans. Champion Exhibitor Awards were presented to Alvin and Dixie Lee, Patrick Vance, Dale Laird, Gene and June Miller. Pat and Mary Krichnen. John Dapas, Frank and Sandy Hudson, and Dennis Burhans. An award was presented to Gene and June Miller for their fawn Diamond Sparrow for achieving Champion Hird Status in 1994.

### Raising Finches in Iowa

National Finch and Softbill Society Lynda Bakula, Corresponding Secretary

Editors note: This is article is part of a letter Lynda sent in reply to several questions an NFSS members had.. Although it is nearly two years old, this letter shows how most people in the midwest begin, grow and learn with their birds. The way aviculturist keep their birds varies from different parts of the country. To let each other know what we do. what has worked and what hasn't worked helps all of us learn. Thanks, Lynda. If you would like to let other people how your birds are managed just contact the NFSS Editor.

24 March, 1994

Dear Steve.

Now for your second question -How does one raise waxbills in Iowa? In my living room and spare bedroom. To try to summarize my history with waxbills: I got my first pair of Red-ears (Mr & Mrs "B") from my husband, for my birthday, four years ago next month. I had them about 1 1/2 years when Mrs "B" laid her first egg. She got egg bound with the second one and had to go to the local vet, but came home after two days. I then started reading more on the birds and slowly learned. The more I read, the more I wanted to get a large aviary for them to fly around in and get enough exercise. This led to the making of a 5'wide X 8'high X 30" deep aviary for the living room. It took us nearly a year to have it built. In Aug 92 while in St. Louis 1 found a pair of Red-cheeked Cordon bleu's (Mr. & Mrs "C") at a local pet shop. I snatched them up. No one locally could get any for me. Then in Nov 92 I got a pair of unrelated Redbilled fire finches (Mr & Mrs Red). He was just starting to turn red and is beautiful now. We had gotten some 1" X 1/2" wire to use in the aviary, but then decided to use plexiglass. So we built one large cage for the 3 pairs, until the aviary was done. Finally got it in June 93. The cage was 48" long, 38" tall and 30" wide. We put down a piece of plywood on top of a 6 drawer chest and then sat the cage on that. It came to within a couple of inches of the ceiling. (We have a cat!) I put in a branch from a tree, got one of the palm plants you can pick up at grocery stores or K-Mart for \$10 and 5 finch nest baskets. I really didn't expect them to use them, but thought I should put them in. The books state that some finches will sleep in nest baskets, although mine neverhave except when on eggs. I had gotten some burlan and cut into 2" in

lengths and raveled it apart and put some in the nest and some on the

bottom of the cage. They all started making nest. In time the Cordon's were sitting on 3 eggs and the Red-ears were sitting also. but were on and off a lot: 1 thought. The Cordon's hatched 2 and the Redears didn't hatch anything. The Fire Finches sar about a week and quit. The Cor-

don's went right back to nest and were sitting again within a week. I cleaned out the Red-eared nest with a spoon (Mr "B" had built this large nest on top of the finch basket). From everything I had read there wasn't much chance that any of them would raise anything. One day while in the bedroom. I heard some little ones. When I checked the nest the Cordon's had 3 babies and in a few days I heard noises from the Red-ear nest. They had 3 little ones, but lost one of them. They all raised them themselves. I had gotten every kind of insect related finch food I could locate and bought any other different type of finch food I could find. They also got lots of mealworms and fly larva. (The Red-ears seem to prefer the mealworms while the Cordon's preferred the fly larva.) I also gave them fresh egg food

atleast twice, and if home 3 or 4 times, a day. They got broccoli, ro-

One day while in the bedroom, I heard some little ones. When I checked the nest, the Cordons had 3 babies and in a few days I heard noises from the Red-ear nest

maine lettuce or spinach almost every day. Since it was in the summer the coom usually staved between 80 and 95 F at all times. They always had fresh bath water and separate drinking water if they wanted it. I changed the papers in their cage everyday even when they

were sitting. The next clutch the Red-ears only hatched one and raised it and the Cordon's raised 2 more.

This year the Cordon's first clutch of 4 eggs were all clear. They were in the aviary and just too many iealous birds I guess. They all interfere with each others love life! I moved them back to the cage above but now there is a partition in the center, so it is 2 cages. They had 2 eggs and hatched both. The oldest lived to be 4 or 5 days old and I found it on the bottom of the cage. Don't know if it was an accident or if it had died. But they still have one and it is now about 10 days old. It now has the first official NFSS band that I have put on a baby. I hope that it isn't the last. Mr & Mrs "C" are just plain good parents. I have to give them all the credit.

The Red-ears this year have laid but are not sitting on the eggs enough to hatch them. Mr "B" is getting old and doesn't get around real good. His flying ability has gone down a lot. They were adults when I got them so he is probably 5 yrs old or more. I haven't checked the nest but I suspect that none of the eggs will be fertile. He has kept himself busy building the nest on top again.

When the birds were first in a 36X18X18 cage, I was close to them a lot and they got use to that. I spent a lot of time with them and talked to them. I believe that definitely helped with the above success. Now that they have been in the bigger aviary they are more skittish of me, especially the Red-ears.

I got a pair of Gold-breast, that came from the import station in Chicago last July and they have had 3 clutches so far. The first clutch they quit sitting on before the eggs hatched, the second time hatched 2 of 4 eggs but didn't feed them, and the 3rd time 4 eggs hatched but didn't feed them. These birds do not feel comfortable around me like the others do. They do not like me to do anything in their cage.

One of the Red-ears that I raised last year has paired up with a male I got at the bird show in Des Moines late last fall. She has laid a couple of eggs, but still being so young and

in the large aviary I don't expect them to raise any.

My Fire Finches have had clutches last year and this year and have yet to raise one. But in a cage by themselves the eggs are usually fertile. They did hatch one hut didn't raise it. They are in the process of making another nest. Time will tell.

Martha (NFSS Bulletin Editor) wants me to write an article for the magazine. Like you said, we are trying to find out how to get participation by members, but how? I don't feel like I am an expert, but yet at the same time if you were just starting out, maybe I could help; some, but not the experienced breeder.

We are moving to St. Louis area as soon as we sell our home here in lowa. My husband took an early retirement and has gone to work with his brother in St. Louis. Later this year we will build a home there, which will have a walk out basement that will have a couple of large flights for my breeding birds. I have acquired 2 more pairs of Red-ears in the last 6 months but they haven't made any nest yet. Hope they will hold off until I get moved.





### European Chaffinch

Fringilla coelebs

by Tim Roche Tewkshury, MA.

Throughout the woodlands. farmlands and backvards of Europe. the song of the Chaffinch is the first indication that "old man winter" is leaving and spring is on his heals. Leaving with winter is the males seasonal plumageof buffish red head and nape, pale chestnut colored back and pinkish chest. In its place remains a bird which can hold its own with birds from more tropical climates. A slate blue with a beak of an almost steely-blue appearance, a warm chestnut back and green rump, reddish pink breast and dark wings and tail with white bars, delivers a very pleasing appearance. The hen is far less colorful being generally "mousey" brown and grey but also possessing the wing and tail bars.

As with a lot of European Finches a basic canary seed diet constitutes its daily requirement. Any wild seeds, such as: plantain and that of chickweed and shepherds purse will also be taken and should be offered as often as possible

If an attempt is to made to breed these birds, then this should be done in a small aviary, due to the birds nervous nature. Cage breeding is rarely successful. They can be

housed with other finches of similar size, but should be monitored for any signs of bullying, as the cock approaches breeding condition. The courtship involves the male chasing the female vigourously about the aviary, continually singing, until they they are both our of breath. Chaffinches tend to avoid canary nest. with pairs choosing their own nest site amongst bunches of heather or other natural foliage. Some will also take over any available ledge. The constructed nest is truly a work of art. A multitude of hair, fine roots and grasses held together with spider webs and surrounded by lichen, provide a fitting nursery for these handsome finches.

Three to five eggs of a reddish hue, take about take about twelve to thirteen days to hatch. It is at this stage the Chaffinch completely changes its dietary requirements. Upon introduction to the aviary for breeding, small quantities of livefood to their daily seed requirement. Mealworms, wax moth larvae and cleaned house fly larvae are all eaten along with any small insect life that that can be collected locally. When the young hatch, the Chaffinches become almost exclusively insectivores. The first few days of life are the most important and unless their need for animal protein is met, the young will almost certainly perish. Young birds will leave the nest at about 15 - 17 days of age and resemble the female in coloration. They continue to be fed by the parents for the next 4 - 6 weeks. Unless destroyed or the eggs are taken for fostering, the length of time taken to rear the young makes the Chaffinches single brooded.

Although not a bird for the novice breeder, those who have had



them don't want to be without them, whilst those who do not; don't know what they are missing. It's time to really establish these birds in U.S. aviculture.

### Breeding Owl Finches

by Lainey Claffin Grasslands Exotic Finches 226 Ash St. Weston, MA 02193 (617) 891-4056

Owl finches are cheerful, active, sociable birds which bring added life to any finch collection. They do best in pairs or groups - a single Owl finch seems to become lonely very quickly - and they can be kept with any other non-aggressive finch species. Like the Gouldian finch, the Owl is a native of Australia and, after several decades of domestication, it has adapted to captivity extremely well.

Most Owl finches breed readily in cages or aviaries, singly or in groups, and they will usually raise their own young. They use all kinds of nests and nesting material, and prefer private nest sites with branches etc. around the nest area. The only problem we have had in breeding Owl finches is that they don't always feed their babies on their first couple of clutches. We often foster the first two clutches to Societies, after which the Owls seem to do much better.

Although juvenile Owls mature quickly, we feel that they should not be bred until they are six to nine months old. We use several methods for sexing Owls: the male sings and

the female does not; the male usually has a thicker black chest band; and the male has more black above the beak.

Like our Zebra finches, we have not found any food our Owls won't eat. They seem to enjoy one food as much as another. Because they are so active, we make sure our owls have lots of things to play with: rocks, swings, mirrors, branches, etc... It doesn't take much to make this bird happy, and it is well worth the effort.

As far as we know there is only one book devoted entirely to Owl finches: Bicheno Finches: Their Care and Breeding,, by A.J. Mobbs, available through



The first member asked.

Has anyone heard of the Timor Sparrow? This fairly large bird is an extremely close relative of the Java Rice Bird. So close in fact that the only difference between Timors and Javas is size and the fact that virtually no one has ever heard of them. I am from California; where, of course, Java Rice Birds are illegal. When I found out about Timor Sparrows I was ecstatic, because I have always wanted Java Rice Birds. Timor mannerisms and breeding characteristics appear to be identical to those of Java Rice Birds. So far I only know of one mutation from this species, that is white.

If you are interested in more information on this species or if you have heard of them and could offer me some more information, I would greatly appreciate it.

#### Editors comment:

\* The Timor Sparrow (Padda fuscata) and the Java Rice Bird (Padda oryzivora) are in the their own Genus, Paddu. Their are so closely-related, like Red-eared waxbills are to St. Helena Waxbilis, that they could also form a super-species. This means that the two species only recently separated. The Timor Sparrow is about 20% smaller than the Java Rice Bird, and is a little less colorful: which would account for Timors being less well-known than Javas. Size and coloration are one of the first characteristics to change, so other those I would expect that two species would be almost identical. I know some Timor Sparrows have been imported. Hopefully there is someone out there who has worked with this species and will respond.

#### Another member asks:



I am seeking information on breeding Spice Finches. I have my birds paired in roomy breeding cages, in a quiet upper area of my birds room. I am using hooded finch nest. Their main diet is Vita Finch (by SunSeed Co.). Of course; they are provided with cuttle bone and mineral block. Is it possible they may not be getting enough hours of daylight?

I am also trying to learn more about African Fire Finches; dietary, housing requirements, etc... I would like to add these to my FinchSave project if their requirements are not to complicated. I am fearful of getting a species that requires livefood. Is there any risk in using open bands? And what risk is there in using dryer lint for nesting material?

#### Editors comment:

Dryer lint is the large chunks of dirt from clothes, you never know what exactly it is made of and what chemicals are in the lint. So I would be very hesitant to use it. With parrots that climb on wire, open bands can get hooked. But I have never heard of a problem with open bands on finches. The ability to keep good records would far out weigh any risk with open bands. I have never tried to raise Fire Finches without livefood. You might check the classified ads in the <u>Bulletin</u> for other breeders of Fire Finches and call them and see what they would recommend. As for the Spice Finches; maybe a Spice Finch breeder will write in for some advice for you.

#### Another member asks:

I have a Zebra Finch, male, who continues with feather picking and pulling despite using "bitter apple". Any suggestions?

#### Editors comment:

Feather plucking results from either a displaced behavior or a repetitive behavior. Displaced behaviors are typically found with parrots. The parrot may want to reproduce and cannot or has some anxiety problem and the bird "takes its problems out on its feathers". Repetitive behavior is caused by boredom. In the wild birds spend most of their time foraging. A small amount of time is used on preening. In captivity birds do not have to forage, and so have a lot of spare time. Some birds spend this time preening and preening. This causes them to have feather loss. Try getting your finch a companion. Any other similar finch should do and/or create some activities for him. Nest building (he doesn't even need a mate to go through the behavior), bathing, picking off spray millet. etc.. Birds have a poor sense of taste, especially finches, so it is no surprise that bitter apple doesn't work.

#### Our last members cries:

Help! I am desperate to find more literature on my Zebra Finches. I have a few books. I am hooked on these little guys and am eager to know more about them. I have raised Zebras for over 8 years, but I need to know more on genetics. Such as; how do I get more pieds, they are my favorite. I am stumped.

# Update On A Gouldian Challenge

A point which I strongly agree with him.

In return I asked him why didn't just write the article in regards to the point he was trying to make and not offend all of the people he did. We talk for about fifteen minutes and both got our points across as two gentleman.

#### The Letter

On the very next day (Jan. 3, 1996). I got a letter from Levin. In this letter, Levin once again proves that he knows nothing about the Gouldian Finch and claims to be able to prove his knowledge about the Gouldian Finch from all the books he has read about them as well

as all he has seen while visiting Gouldian breeders and from all he has been told or heard about them. Well Levin I don't think so, that's is as dumb as judging a book by its cover, you cannot pass judgment on a bird without working with it yourself.

As I re-read the article by Levin and his letter, the true reason for Levin's article had nothing to with Gouldians or their large numbers in captivity or the shortage of people breeding other birds, as Levin already knows there are a large mumber of breeding programs in the U.S., alone, such as the NFSS FINCH SAVE program, the A.F.A RED SISKIN project, (just to name a few) as well as the programs created by birds clubs and all the individual breeders which work at home with birds that no one about, as I do with the whydahs.

The real reason behind Levin's article is MONEY. He is upset at the price that Gouldian breeders get for their Goulds, a price which he can not get for his waxbills. (This point was later confirmed in a letter sent to me in Levin's defense by a very good friend of Levin's

It is a shame that we have people like this, when we should all be working together in breeding and promoting all hirds regardless of if they are already domestic or wild caught, especially not knowing when we will be able to once again bring some of these birds back into this country with the importation ban we know now have. I hope this will be the last we read about the Gouldian malaise or any other malaise. And Levin I hope that the next time you decide to criticize a bird that you don't like as you stated at the end of your letter that you at least have the decency to work with the bird before writing another article about a bird you know nothing about.

### LEG BANDING PROCEDURE

#### courtesy of The National Finch and Softbill Society



The most important thing to remember when banding chicks is to do it over a counter or table so if the chick is dropped it doesn't fall to the floor. The age to band varies between species but is generally between 5 and 10 days. You can tell by looking at the ankle joint (the joint where the toes come together) and the size of the band.




Have the bands, a toothpick (or other small blunt instrument) and some lubricant ready. Be sure you have the bands "right side up" for easier reading.



The band is generally placed on the bird's right leg. Banding just before the parents go to roost in the evening will prevent them from picking at the band. By the next morning they will have forgotten about it.



Hold the chick firmly but in such a way as to not cut off its breathing and so that you don't harm it. Remember, their bodies cannot tolerate compression. Put a little bit of lubricant on the chick's foot and slide the band over the three front toes and finally over the ankle joint. The back toe will probably have to be gently pried out from under the band with a toothpick. The band now should be in the proper location between the ankle and the elbow joints.



Check on the chick the next few days to be sure that the band has not slipped off and that there are no scrapes or irritations on the foot or leg.
