

NFSS ANNUAL CENSUS

THE 2012 ONLINE CENSUS IS NOW OPEN and will remain open through the end of February 2013. Everyone with the means to participate in the Census online is encouraged to do so. The online system takes only a few moments to complete, data is collected and tallied immediately, and you can log in at any time to change your data as long as the Census is open. You will also be able to view the overall totals as they come in. Your personal information is not disclosed unless you choose to share contact information with other fanciers.

While online participation is encouraged, mail-in Census forms will also be accepted for those without Internet access.

The Census is an important function of the NFSS. The data collected will help us assess the state of aviculture in the United States and Canada, as well as analyze trends over time. Everyone's participation is encouraged no matter how many birds you keep, whether you breed or just enjoy, whether you are an NFSS member or not. The more data we get, the better we can understand our hobby. Because this is the 2012 Census, please do not include birds that were purchased/hatched after December 31, 2012 in your counts.

2012 CENSUS INSTRUCTIONS

To participate in the Census online (preferred), simply visit www.nfss-fss.org/Census

and follow the instructions to create an account, log in, and submit your data. Returning participants may choose to log in with their previous account information or create a new account.

To participate in the Census via mail, fill out the form included in this journal and mail it to me at the address on the following page. Tracking mutation data is not a goal of the Census. Limited mutation data is collected only to help connect breeders. Mutation combinations are not supported, so you must choose which mutation to enter such birds under. You are free to enter all your birds as Normal (or Other) rather than enter them by mutation to keep the process simple.

Supported mutations are as follows.

Gouldians (body color only): Normal, Blue, Dilute, Pastel, Silver, Yellow, Other

Red Throated Parrot Finch: Normal, Pied, Seagreen

Society Finch: All White, Chestnut and White Pied, Chestnut Self, Chocolate and White Pied, Chocolate Self, Crested (any color), Euro Black Brown, Euro Grey, Euro Red Brown, Fawn and White Pied, Fawn Self, Pearl, Other


Star Finch: Normal, Isabelle (any head color), Pied (any body/head color), Yellow-faced

Zebra Finch: Normal Grey, Black-breasted, Black-cheeked, Black-faced, Chestnut-flanked White, Cream, Crested, Dominant Silver, Eumo, Fawn, Fawn-cheeked, Florida Fancy, Lightback, Orange-breasted, Other, Penguin, Pied, Recessive Silver, White

The Census is open to both NFSS members and non-members in order to get the most accurate portrait of the birds we are keeping in the fancy. Please help to contribute to the success of the program by participating and spreading the word! Feel free to contact me if you have any questions or comments about the Census.

Food for Whitercheeked Turacos

WHITE-CHEEKED TURACOS ARE 97% FRUIT EATERS. They consume live food but mainly when they have chicks in the nest. Throughout the year food requirements are basically the same, with the addition of certain fruits when they are breeding.

I feed the following to one pair of birds each day but this is increased if/when chicks arrive on the scene.

30 grapes of any color • one large banana • half a pear

I add to this on different days, either
half a small tin of Mandarin orange segments • strawberries
blackberries • red currants • raspberries
one-fourth mango •papaya • a few soaked dog biscuits

In the outside aviary, there may be a problem in preventing food from freezing in the winter. Try to use fruit with less moisture content, which is easier said than done. Add dry currants/sultanans/raisins to the dish. In really bad weather you may need to provide smaller portions and change food regularly all day.

At this time I am experimenting with a small heat source to stop fruit freezing. If this is successful and does not cost too much to implement I will let you know!

Fruit should be chopped into small-size pieces, and grapes and small items cut into halves or quarters. Sprinkle a small amount of low iron insectivorous food over the food and mix thoroughly.

Different-colored fruit seems to attract their attention (such as strawberries or red grapes). During the breeding season I find papaya is consumed in much larger quantities, plus I provide a separate dish of insectivorous food.

If there are budding trees or plants in the aviary these may occasionally be eaten. If there are two chicks in the nest, two weeks after the hatching the food quantity will be doubled. However, when sitting on eggs, less food is consumed.

White-cheeked Turacos do not pick up food and give it to their chicks. They regurgitate everything, placing their beaks into the chick's beaks. It is quite a sight if you have never seen it before. Remember, Turacos do not have a crop and whatever is fed to them will be excreted 20 or 30 minutes after being eaten; eg., if you feed a dish of blackberries, then after 30 minutes it will look like they are excreting crude oil!

I have found live food plays an important role in rearing chicks. Obviously, in a large aviary the adults will find a certain amount of their own live food which is added to whatever I can find or purchase for them. Slugs of any size are eaten, plus small snails and earthworms.

I understand some people are reluctant to feed these things but I find the benefits outweigh the hazards, and if this means the difference between success and failure, then what would you do?

In my experience it seems to be mainly cocks that relish live food. They then pass this on to the hens and also the chicks. What puzzles me is how a two-inch-long slug can be swallowed and broken down into manageable pulp for feeding to chicks in a small period of time.

GOLDEN RULE

Do not use slug pellets in your garden and try to convince your neighbors not to either. This not only could save your birds, but other visitors to your garden, such as Blackbirds and Hedgehogs will be protected, too.

Always remember there are no strict guidelines to follow or which work best—only the ones that suit your birds and you!

I found especially interesting Darren Sefton's article, *The Magic of the Okavango*. His narration of where this trip for himself and his wife began, how they got to their destination, conveniences they *did not have*, things they got to do, and pictures to go with it was remarkable.

Hand-feeding From An Egg by Ron Castaner

Did you get your bird as an egg or un-weaned? Would you do it again?

What I'm Going to Write about is my experience of hand-feeding from an egg. There are a few ways to feed a bird but first, we need to know something about the bird and their requirements because it makes a big difference.

Some birds have a crop, some don't; some eat insects, some don't. Some need to be fed every hour and a very small amount, some don't. Then we have to make sure we understand the bird we're hand-feeding and the requirements it needs. Temperature and humidity are very important in some birds. At what age should we start hand-feeding? To those experienced breeders we don't have a luxury to choose at what age we start or when is the best time. There are many reasons parents don't want to feed the bird; parents die, too many in the nest for parents to feed, and I'm sure they're a few more but you get the idea.

I have hand-fed many birds and many types in my life, from one of the smallest (Strawberry Finch) to one of the biggest, the Moluccan Cockatoo. To hand-feed the Strawberry Finch I had to use a pair of magnifying glasses, the kind that go around the head, to make sure I could see the mouth opening.

I have shown members the Black-crested Finch I hand-fed and the difference in them. They have no crop and you have to make sure you don't over-feed that species. The love and the requirements of insect they need in their diet, no formula. Much different from the Zebra Finch and the Congo African Gray, because they have a crop and you feed them formula from any company you choose.

A few years ago, I won't tell you how long, I drove to Homestead (Miami) to see a person that had some Congo African Grays for sale. I still remember that day. He didn't know me well and didn't know my experience in birds. He was very reluctant to sell me the bird, which I was not surprised as he loved his birds.

I mentioned to him my experience and who I was. After a while he agreed to sell me the bird with no guarantees—you will know why.

We walked to his backyard; there were a few acres full of cages and birds. He knew what I was looking for. I said I wanted a Congo Gray, he said okay, and I said only a day or two old. He looked at me and said "no way", and again we started.

After a few minutes we walked again and stopped at the pair of beautiful Congos. He opened the nest and there it was, a baby Congo just born, the egg still in the nest. I said that's what I want.

We picked up the egg and the baby Congo with a spoon, and I brought him home. I came prepared; I had a heating pad and incubator with me and I had another incubator at home ready for the bird. I had the temperature and humidity set a couple of days ahead to make sure it was working normal.

From that moment on it was like having a child, making sure it was fed, making sure the utensils were disinfected, making sure the formula was not too cold or too hot, making sure your hands were clean and not to touch anything else, especially another bird. Birds at that age are very prone to disease; there is very little immunity to any disease at that age.

You have to make sure you are at home on time to feed, especially the first few weeks, which are the most critical. You have to make sure you keep checking the temperature and humidity, and you have to do it quite often. After you have a routine down and schedule set, there is no problem or reason why anyone would not try, the main thing again, get to know the bird and the requirements it needs. Every bird and species is different, what is good for one might not be good for another, keep that in mind.

The rewards are beyond anyone's expectation. What a treat it is to see their eyes open for the first time, and you're there to see it happen. To them you're the world and parent, they will trust you, believe me they will bond with you. Care and love is all they need, no fancy cars, house, boats, makeup, or hairstyle—they will love you as you are and ask for nothing in return.

The older they get the more love they need. They will show you and explain to you what they need. Watch their reactions to things, take a moment to understand what they're trying to tell you, because they're always telling you something new.

To those that are not experienced in hand-feeding a bird, you should have someone show you how to hand-feed a bird. Maybe the person where you bought the bird will let you keep it there till the bird is weaned, than you can stop there and try to hand-feed it yourself while they watch. You need to learn a few things, how much to feed the bird and how often, how warm the formula should be, and at what temperature and humidity the incubator should be kept, if need be. I'm sure after a while you will know how.

Try to bond with the bird as soon as possible. Show them your needs at an early age. Show them when to go to bed, when to be quiet, when it is ok to be loud, and potty train the bird. At an early age you can teach them almost anything, be patient and be consistent.

Would I do it again? Yes, I would. I feel there is nothing more rewarding than to hand-feed your own bird. You will get to know the bird's needs at a very early age. Every bird will be different, even if it is the same kind. Just like humans, everyone is different in their own way, birds are the same.

My treasure of a hand-fed bird was a Diamond Fire Tail from Australia, which I hand-fed. The most intelligent bird I have ever seen in my life. He didn't need to talk; I knew what he wanted by his actions, he also knew mine. I'm sure some of you had the opportunity to see him and how much he loved to be with people.

In closing I would like to bring to your attention that a bird is like a permanent two-year-old child. They will depend on you; they have no fear, so be very careful around the house, especially your kitchen, and never leave a bird loose while you're cooking. Take all the precautions you can, it's never enough.

Will I do it again? Yes I will. The experience and satisfaction is very rewarding. You will have a friend for life that doesn't care how you look, how much you have, or what kind of car you drive. All it needs is your love, care, and understanding. Keep it safe and out of harm's way.

2012 National Cage Bird Show Highlights

St. Louis, Missouri, was the home of the 64[™] Annual National Cage Bird Show, specifically the Millennium Hotel in the downtown area—just across the street from the beautiful St. Louis Arch. Exhibitors began arriving as early as Wednesday morning and by Thursday morning the lobby was filled with birds in cages, exhibitors, suitcases, and bellhops running in several directions.

The distances some of the exhibitors drove to be a part of this event was tremendous! Laura Watkins and Janet Edmonds came from California—30 hours! Danny Maldonado and Ken Rampersaud from New York—probably about the same amount of time; Vince and Kendra Moase, along with Ricki Gaskin, came from Canada; Ginny Allen was from southern Alabama; and Vince and Sally Huntington drove from California also. I'm sure there are several more that drove as far, or farther, but these are just a few that come to mind.

Due to some unforeseen circumstances, the scheduled judge for the Finch/Softbill Division, Clarence Culwell, was unable to attend, but Laura Bewley, long-time NFSS Panel Judge and 4th Vice President/Judge's Panel Chair for the NFSS Board of Directors, stepped in to serve as judge for the 2012 event. Vanessa Brugueras, our usual NCBS Show Secretary, was unable to attend due to health issues. We missed Vanessa and her smiling face but Laura Watkins sat down in the Secretary's chair and we were off and running. Vince Moase and Ken Rampersaud graciously agreed to serve as Show Stewards.

Friday evening was the usual "Hospitality Night" and auction of the birds donated by last year's Higgins Winners. Bob Peers won the bid on the birds donated by the winner of the Finch and Softbill Division in 2011 (Rebecca Mikel)—a pair of Dybowski Twinspots (sure hope Andrew doesn't look in the bird room any time soon for those Dybowskis!).

There were a total of 190 birds in the Finch/Softbill Division—one of the largest groups in a few years, with a total of 24 exhibitors. This year was a bit different in that Lovebirds, Cockatiels, Parrots, and Parakeets were in a separate room. The show stands built by "Jim" at Corners Limited provided such a professional consistent appearance from one Division to the next.

One by one, the other Divisions concluded their competitions, while Laura proceeded with Class after Class, Section after Section, until we were ready for the Final Top 10. Sally Huntington took home Top Finch with a Lightback Zebra as well as Top Softbill with a Pekin Robin. We all have our work cut out for us next year—beating Sally!!

From the Judge's Eye

My NCBS EXPERIENCE SURPASSED MY EXPECTATIONS this year as I had the honor of judging the Finch and Softbill Division. I would like to thank Stewards Vince Moase and Ken Rampersaud, Secretary Laura Watkins, and Backup Secretary Rebecca Mikel for their help. They made a great support team and with their help worked through the 190 birds without a problem. Thank you for volunteering your time. I know you missed having the freedom to wander the show, hang out with friends, look over other divisions, and a peaceful lunch. I want you to know I appreciated your support throughout the judging process. Susan Stieve, thank you for filling in during the steward's breaks. Your helpfulness is appreciated. Cheryl Burns, thank you for helping with ribbons as needed, and supplying me with refreshment.

I would like to thank all exhibitors for bringing some wonderful birds to the show. We had a nice variety in each section. Overall the birds were in great condition and competition was tough. The softbill section contained some beautiful birds ranging from a very small Blue Dacris to a Toucanette on guard to get a taste of anyone's finger that came close enough.

A Pekin Robin won the section, then placed 2nd in the show. It possessed glowing condition and extreme restraint to control its energy inside the show box. Sally Huntington, breeder and exhibitor of this beautiful bird, would be someone to council with on getting your birds in winning shape.

The Zebra section included beautiful color mutations: black-cheeked, black-breasted, chestnut-flanked white, orange-breasted, and pied, to name a few. There was an impressive crest on one little Crested Fawn Zebra that placed 10th in show. It displayed the beautiful depth of color a black-cheeked can have. The normal zebras and a nicely marked pied had good conformation, but the zebra to beat was Sally and Vince Huntington's lightback. The bird was unbeatable with spot on condition, very nice evenness of color, and well-defined markings. The cage training and stamina shown by this bird enabled him to show off his best assets and win Best in Show.

The Gouldians shown did not disappoint us with their color, condition, and size. There were a good number of them shown with a normal Red-headed Gouldian cock exhibited by Julie Lawson taking the section with a body size very close to the desired 5½ inches and excellent condition. Overall the Gouldians seemed rather nervous in the show boxes and would have done better in the show had they had better deportment. When you are that beautiful you should never fear the stage.

In the Other Australian Finches section we had the treat to view a group of Cherry Finches (Plum-heads) displaying their muted but striking coloration, some very nice Chestnut-breasted Mannikins and Masked Grass Finches but which were all overpowered by a normal Shaftail. Exhibited by Vince Moase of Canada, the Shaftail was immaculate as we expect one to be but also exhibited nice stance and demeanor. Its best asset though was its conformation. One of the Masked Grass Finches in this section sang his heart out on the show bench trying his best to catch our attention. Later, I found out he had to sing for his supper at Vince Huntington's and was just working his magic voice to see what he could get.

The Indo-Pacific section gave us a chance to view some outstanding birds with a Red-headed Parrot Finch and Lutino Red-headed Parrot Finch topping the section. A nice group of Spice Finches, a White-hooded Nun, and some Forbes Parrot Finches were also a treat to view in this section. The birds here faced some condition and deportment challenges but the Red-headed Parrot Finch exhibited by Lisa Murphy towered over the others with very nice condition and intense color to place 7th in show.

The Society Finches were delightful. The self-colored American societies dominated the Society Finch section and an American Self Fawn won the section with good condition, evenness and depth of color, outstanding conformation and a will to win (Or some would say good deportment.). This bird, bred and shown by Cheryl Burns, went on to place 4th in show. There was a powerful European Goldfinch competing among a few other Goldfinches that stole the European Finches section and placed 6th best in show. The bird not only had good conformation and excellent color it displayed good deportment.

There were some other fine birds in this section such as normal and cinnamon Greenfinches. The Finches of Africa section brought color and variety to the show. A Black-bellied Firefinch was a special treat to see, as was a couple of Purple Grenadiers. A Paradise Whydah was shown displaying his graceful movement with a 12-inch long tail. Although no birds from this section placed in the top 10 in show, several of these birds could take best in show on another day with some rest and conditioning.

The next section, Finches of the Americas, offered an interesting group, where a Crimson Pileated took first, then placed 9th best in show. Exhibited by Rebecca Mikel it never did give us a peek at his crest but displayed beauty and grace in the show box. Another interesting bird was the Ruddy-breasted Seedeater, a petite bird with subtle yet powerful coloration.

Then came the Doves and Quail section where an amazingly cage-friendly, good-conditioned Button Quail placed first. The exhibitor of this bird, Laura Watkins, shared a quail travel tip with me after the show on keeping your quail in great shape while traveling cross-country. She placed bubble wrap inside the cage top to keep the little guy from hurting his head as quail are known to fly straight up when startled. This way he would crash into a soft substance instead of the hard wood cage top.

Last we had the Pairs section where a nice variety of pairs were exhibited. A beautiful pair of Self Society Finches and a very good pair of Zebra Finches were in the group but a super pair of Gold-breasted Waxbills placed first and then took 8th in show. The Gold-breasted pair exhibited by Vince Moase was in good condition, was attentive to one another, and worked the box like winners.

In conclusion, this group of 190 birds was fun to judge and a delight to see up close. I applaud the exhibitors; many traveled long distances with their prized birds to compete with the best across the nation.

I truly feel going to the National Cage Bird Show is a worthwhile trip although expensive and should be made by people wanting to grow in knowledge and understanding of finches and softbills. The show is not only a place for competition but a major educational opportunity. Where can you meet breeders from across the nation, compare your birds with the best birds being shown, and make friends to share your enthusiasm all in one weekend?

There is no other show like the National Cage Bird Show. All exhibitors and enthusiasts are welcomed with educational seminars such as the Afternoon of Aviculture organized by Sally Huntington and sponsored by NFSS, exhibits from vendors in the bird industry displaying the latest products to help you be successful at your hobby, national specialty club meetings where you can meet the people who are working with the same challenges you are and are providing information to help you enjoy your birds, and you also get to look at many different bird species where you might just fall in love with a new type of bird, and the best group of bird-lovers you could ever hang out with.

The 2013 NCBS is in Tulsa, Oklahoma at the Southern Hills Marriott. This is my home town and I hope you will come visit and exhibit and have as much fun as a new chick out of the nest.

In Memory Of Or. Richard E. Baer

It is with sadness NFSS reports the death of Dr. Richard E. Baer (age 96). He passed away November 28, 2012 at his home in Groveport, Ohio. A 1939 veterinarian graduate, his career took him on assignments to Mexico and Puerto Rico for many years. Most are probably too young to have known "Dick" but he was an energetic force for the good of aviculture. He was an early president of the American Federation of Aviculture (AFA) and a fixture at the AFA conventions for years. He openly shared with many others his knowledge of soft-billed birds, as well as his other experiences. Dr. Baer was heavily involved in the Newcastle crisis of the '70s. When I visited him this past spring he was full of energy and ideas, talking about his plans for the next twenty years. Even if you never knew him, you should feel the loss aviculture suffers from his passing.
