

## West Coast Zebra and Society Finch Show 2008

On July 25th and 26th all roads led to the center of Sacramento, CA for the Third Annual West Coast Zebra and Society Finch Show; a special event created and supported by west coast finch breeders, not to compete with other sanctioned shows out there, but to encourage more people to enter the show hobby with the two most common finches as well as putting an emphasis on improving show quality in all mutations of each species through friendly competition.

On Friday, the show committee members had their work cut out for them. Transform an empty room into a show bench, sales area, and raffle table, with space people and birds to be comfortable, and do it all before 5PM when the doors opened for business. 

## Fiery Redheads Rule The Roost

Many people have shown an interest in the scientific research we are doing on the Gouldian finch. We hope that by keeping you informed we can repay some of the much appreciated support. In this first scientific newsletter, I will explore some of our recent research on the behavioural, physiological and genetic differences between the three head colour varieties (morphs) with regards to dominance. Not only does understanding how individuals compete for access to limited nest sites and food help us to understand the dynamics in wild populations, as you will see, understanding dominance is also crucial for effectively housing and breeding Gouldian finches in aviaries.

#### Fiery Redheads Rule The Roost Continued

Alexander the Great, Billy the Kid, Eric the Red, Napoleon, Winston Churchill and even Vladimir Lenin was rumoured to be one before he went bald - all red-heads infamous for their fiery tempers. Recent work has revealed a similar pattern among Gouldian finches where, in the bird world at least, red-heads have an evolutionary advantage allowing them to rule the pecking order. Wild-type Gouldians (which form the basis of our study) have either a red, black or yellow head, and our studies on hundreds of birds have shown that red-heads are dominant to both the black- and yellowheads.

Similar to hair colour in humans, head colour in Gouldian finches is genetically-inherited (from parents), but unlike us, the head colour of Gouldians is discreet, with no variation in between. This occurrence of different head colour varieties (morphs) in wild populations of a bird, or indeed any animal species, is very rare. This is because selection (e.g. from mates, predators) tends to produce only the single-best colour form for each species - as we see in pretty much every other animal species. From an evolutionarily perspective, this makes the Gouldian finch a very unique and interesting species, and one of our major aims is to understand how and why these three head colour morphs coexist together.

To do this, we started by looking at behavioural differences between the different colour morphs. Since different genes control the expression of the different head colours (red, yellow and black), theoretically, it seems likely that these different genes could also control (or be linked to) other genes which determine different behaviours. To test this theory, we looked at how dominance behaviours differed between the birds, because competition for access to food, nest sites and mates is a crucial component of a bird's fitness (reproductive success) – without any of these, birds are unable to successfully breed.

To begin with we staged unfamiliar males in competition over access to limited food, and watched to see who claimed control of the food. Redheads won. Matched with either black- or yellow-heads, the redheads strongly dominated, while black-heads outcompeted yellow-heads.

We then gave the birds a colour make-over by temporarily dying them red or black to determine whether head colour was a communication 'signal' between birds. The birds definitely paid attention to head colour as they were reluctant to compete with opponents that had reddyed heads. For example, although vellow-heads are at the bottom of the pecking order, when yellow-heads are temporarily dyed red they gain the top spot -because none of the other birds will attack or fight them. This demonstrates that these birds do pay very close attention to the colour signal and use it to avoid getting into fights with red-heads.

Other birds avoid conflicts with red-

heads for a very good reason – redheads are highly aggressive. Even when the red-heads had their heads blackened (i.e. red dominance status removed), they still managed to dominate the other birds, and they did this by initiating and sustaining more physical fights. This is because red-heads are truly very aggressive and therefore it pays black- and yellow-headed birds to avoid fighting with them – because they will lose.



Why are red-heads so aggressive?

Some recent work carried out this year aimed to answer this question by investigating individual responses in different aggressive situations. For this experiment, males were placed in a range of different social environments, which varied only in the ratios of red-heads to black-heads, and we measured a range of behavioural, hormonal and health (immune function) parameters. What we found was rather surprising, because although male birds in a number of species are predisposed to aggression through their genetic make-up, in Gouldian finches it is their social

situation that actually influences the amount of aggression they display.

When birds were kept in complete isolation (i.e. single bird per cage), there were no differences in hormones and immune performance between red- and black-heads. However, in socially competitive environments (i.e. when the frequencies of aggressive red-heads increase), red-heads responded aggressively,

elevating their testosterone levels to over five times their baseline. whereas black-heads reduced their testosterone levels in response to higher frequencies of red-heads. other In words, this means that as the frequencies of red-heads increase within a cage, red-heads

become very aggressive, while black-heads become very submissive. The high aggression (i.e. high testosterone levels) of red-head males gives them a huge advantage over black- and yellow-heads during competition for food, nest sites and mates.

Although male birds in a number of species are predisposed to aggression through their genetic make-up, in Gouldian finches it is their social situation that actually influences the amount of aggression they display.

However, this high aggression in red-headed birds is not without cost In these competitive environments. when there are high frequencies of red-heads, red-head males have a highly elevated stress response (this is indicated by the stress hormone corticosterone), and they also suffer severe health risks because they cannot maintain normal levels of immune function. This contrasts with the submissive black-head males that show little or no stress response or reduced immune function to socially competitive environments Therefore, red-heads and blackheads respond very differently to aggressive environments. This is a very exciting find for us because this is the first study to show that aggression is socially mediated and not simply linked to genes.

#### What does this mean for breeders?

These findings have a number of important implications, which will hopefully be useful for owners and breeders of Gouldian finches.

First, to maintain healthy, stress-free populations (i.e. multiple birds in a single cage), red-heads should be kept at lower densities than either black-heads or yellow-heads. It is important to note that variation in 'stress' is not an easily measurable index (without specific blood and hormone assays), but ultimately, stressed birds are more susceptible to pathogens, parasites and disease, and therefore are more likely to get sick. When breeding birds in large

populations it is particularly important to keep red-heads at lower densities, because breeding increases the normal stress load placed on birds – and this effect is exaggerated in red-heads.

Second, for breeders keeping mixed populations of Gouldian finches, it is important to get the balance between red-heads and black-heads right. We know that red-heads and black-heads respond very differently to aggressive environments: redheads are very sensitive become highly stressed at high densities, whereas black-heads are more passive and appear to be buffered against these social stressors. As a guide, mixed populations should contain no more than 30% red-heads. In fact, this is the frequency of red-head birds observed in wild populations (with black-heads making up 70% and the rare yellowheads less than 1%) and is by the far the most successful breeding frequency across our large populationbased studies

In addition to the specific dominance effects between the colour morphs, there are also a number of general management tools which can help to reduce negative dominance effects in caged birds.

Simply by looking at the head colour of birds we are now able to predict how they will respond to stressful and competitive environments.

#### Fiery Redheads Rule The Roost Continued

First, it is important to provide 'unlimited' resources to avoid creating highly competitive environments when housing or breeding birds in populations. This means providing multiple food dishes to prevent one or a few birds dominating the food (and preventing subordinates from feeding), and also providing an excess of nesting sites (e.g. nest boxes) to avoid dominant birds disrupting other breeding pairs. As a rough guide, for every 5 birds there should be an extra food bowl, and during breeding, provide 20-50% more nest boxes than the number of breeding pairs.

Second, it is important to provide a number of 'safe houses' within a cage or aviary, so that subordinate individuals are able to escape from aggressive birds. In aviaries, this can be done by placing a number of vegetation thickets within the cage, creating sub-areas (e.g. joining multiple cages) and also by increasing the number of available nest boxes. Specifically designed perches with safe compartments to perch and roost, such as those provided by the

'de-stress perches' (see the photo below; all details on these perches are provided in Evans & Fidler 2005, The Gouldian Finch) are very effective for reducing stress Gouldians.

Lastly, although this may initially appear counter-intuitive, it is important to allow birds to successfully establish dominance hierarchies. Dominance is an important natural behaviour in all animals, used to resolve conflicts over access to limited resources. Birds have evolved a variety of methods to passively 'signal' their relative dominance status, without having to continuously fight with every individual (and hence wasting energy and risking injury). They may use signals such as a colour display (e.g. red head used to signal aggression), or more subtle behavioural cue, such as dominant (e.g. raised body) or submissive (i.e. crouched body) posturing. Such behavioural signals provide us with very important insight into how birds communicate.

For example, Gouldian finches (and probably a number of other birds)



characteristically attack from above and will not aggressively displace their opponents from a vertically lower position. As a consequence, dominant males typically occupy and defend the highest perch, nest box or position in an aviary. This means by simply looking at which bird spends most of their time on the top perch or breeds in the highest nest box, you will be able to identify the dominant birds. There are ways to aid birds in establishing a stable dominance rank by helping them to quickly and effectively establish a dominance hierarchy - contrary to expectations. this will actually reduce (rather than increase) aggression within a population.



For example, individuals who can simply signal their relative dominance status by where they perch or nest within a cage will substantially reduce the number of aggressive conflicts and fights needed to establish their dominance status. In contrast, bird's which perch or nest in a

uniform environment (i.e. where all resources are the same height) are unable to passively signal their dominance status and will therefore have to engage in more aggressive conflicts or fights to determine the relative fighting ability of their opponents (i.e. this results in increased aggression and fighting). As a management tool, it is easy to create opportunities for birds to occupy their relative dominance position in an aviary by simply providing a range of perches and nest boxes along a vertical gradient, from very low to very high in the cage (see photo).

Reduce aggression by helping birds establish dominance hierarchies, using perches and nest boxes positioned along a vertical gradient

Overall, by using some of these simple guidelines, you should be able to reduce aggression within populations and in doing so provide a stress-free and optimal environment for housing and breeding birds.

#### Future research plans

This article outlines some of our findings regarding dominance. Our work on the wild populations in the Kimberley is also continuing (with great success) and over the next year we will report on the threats and current management plans for these endangered populations. We also have big plans for the next few years (in some

new and very exciting areas) and they will no doubt be of interest to all Gouldian finch supporters and breeders – we will continue to keep you up to date with our research on this amazing little finch.





## 2008 By-Law Revision

## Important notes

This not-so-short article is designed to explain the many revisions that were made by the bylaw committee. During the fall of 2007, after the Board elected me to Chair the committee, I carefully reviewed the bylaws. I updated them to bring them into the electronic age and made several other changes and corrections to make them more responsive to the members and functional for the Board. On January 2nd we started our committee work which included members President Bob Peers, Tom Keegan, Rebecca Mikel, Andy Mordoh, Lisa Murphy, Doug White, John Wilson, and myself as Chairman.

The revision was accomplished by revising each paragraph, one at a time, after complete discussion and suggestions were received from each member of the committee. Final decisions were made by a consensus of the opinions presented. The revision was then presented to the Board of Directors for its review and comments. After a consensus, those changes were also included in the bylaws. This article does not cover the many spelling, grammar, punctuation and numbering changes that were made or corrected.

The mission statement was not changed but the wording was cleaned up. This was done to make the statement more coherent and to clarify our role in working with other organizations to preserve our hobby.

Throughout the document, when an officer may recieve funds from any source, wording has been added to assure timely reporting and mailing of funds to the Treasurer.

Article 2 was enhanced to include our calendar year for operations and tax reporting purposes.

Article 4, paragraph 2 was changed to allow latitude in how dual membership votes will be submitted.

Article 4, paragraph 4 was changed to define when a member's membership shall end and sets a time limit for members to renew and keep their membership number active as it relates to exhibition points and other related data attached to their membership number.

Article 4, paragraph 6 is a brand new paragraph. Although the original bylaws defined Affiliates, the 2005 revision left out any definition or mention of Affiliates. This new paragraph details their membership status and benefits under their affiliation agreement and deals with voting rights. Please note that the original bylaws had numbering errors in Article 5.

Article 5, paragraph 1 spells out the voting rights of an appointed or Pro Tem officer. It also spells out that the Board of Directors may create or eliminate manager positions as needed.

Article 5 paragraph 2 clarifies how and when an election ballot must be presented to the membership and when it must be returned. It also details how the ballots will be counted and how the election committee determines the winner of each office. The old paragraph was very vague and did not take into account how a winner would be determined should more than two candidates run for any particlar office. The new paragraph also deals with how we break a tie for any elected position.

Article 5, paragraph 3 has been changed to better explain situations pertaining to running for office. It explains that a member may not run for more than one office, that a presently elected officer may temporarily assume the duties of another officer as detailed by the by-laws, and how we handle submission of more than three candidates for any particular office.

Article 5, paragraph 4 specifies with more accuracy and clarity as to how we count ballots.

Article 5, paragraph 5 details with more clarity how long an appointed officer to an elected position may serve. Article 5, paragraph 6 better defines the order of succession in accordance with our bylaws.

Article 5, paragraph 8 gives the responsibility from the Advertising and Promotions Manager to the Second Vice President.

Article 5, paragraph 9 adds detail as to the financial responsibility of this office. This same statement was added to all paragraphs where the officer has some responsibility to provide reports and or send monies to the Treasurer in a timely manner.

Article 5, paragraph 12 was revamped to more accurately explain the Treasurer's responsibility as it pertains to IRS filings, the handling of funds, the paying of bills, and how and when audits of our accounts must be completed.

Article 5, paragraph 14 Title changed to Affiliate/Awards Director.

Article 5, paragraph 16 details the responsibility of the Finchshop director as it pertains to Society inventory and property.

Article 5, paragraph 17 more clearly defines the Regional Vice Presidents' responsibilities with regard to assisting with legislative matters, holding meetings, and the necessity of reporting to the Board their activities within their region which they have taken part in to benefit NFSS.

Article 5, paragraph 18 was enhanced to include a statement regarding the timely delivery of the Journal to members.

#### 2008 By-Law Revision Continued

Article 5, paragraph 20 Changes to include the Web Site in duties, and cooperation with the Journal Editor.

Article 5, paragraph 21 was completely rewritten, it basically says the same thing but in a more coherent way.

Article 5, paragraph 22 was totally rewritten to better detail responsibilities, both locally and nationally. It also defines the responsibility to report negative efforts to the Board and more coherently explains that we will work with other organizations as it relates to pre-legislative or legislative actions that may not be in our best interest.

Article 5, paragraph 25 is a totally new paragraph dealing with the newly appointed position of Parliamentarian.

Article 6, paragraph 2 has been updated to include the electronic or face-to-face meetings held by the Board. It also states when the 4th quarterly meeting may start.

Article 6, paragraph 3 explains how and when agenda items must be presented.

Article 6, paragraph 4 has sub paragraphs that are numbered 4.0, 4.1, and 4.2. These are new paragraphs that clearly detail how we conduct our meeting in an electronic era. This section also details a Board member's responsibility to monitor email and provides for penalties that may be imposed for missing meetings. Further it details how we handle electronic failures.

Article 6, paragraph 5 changes emergency meetings from without notice to requiring a 24 hour notice.

Article 6, paragraph 7 is a totally new paragraph. This paragraph limits the responsibility of Board members from being personally responsible for Society debts. It also states that no member may receive any benefit from any asset of the Society and that no monies will be used for personal use.

Article 7, most paragraphs were re-worded to be more coherent.

Article 7, paragraph 7 now has sub paragraphs 7.0, 7.1 and 7.2. The paragraphs have been totally rewritten to clarify how a judge is accepted to the panel. 7.1 also now requires the retention of all documents relating to a judges acceptance to the panel. There is also wording that forbids a judge from judging if they are not in good standing.

Article 8, paragraph 2 has been totally rewritten.

Article 8, paragraph 3 has been changed to allow for a year to date financial report and suggestions for the next budget year.

Article 10 paragraph 1 now includes a statement that allows the Board of Directors to deny consideration of any proposed amendment to the bylaws that it feels is injurious to the society or that is in violation of our mission statement or other provisions of the by-laws.

Article 10 paragraph 2 states when

proposed amendments must be published and how the ballots are counted.

There were several other small changes not covered here. For a comparison to the existing bylaws, please see the NFSS web site or you may request a hard copy from Executive Secretary Rebecca Mikel.

The Board of Directors voted on this final draft and approved sending it to the membership for a vote. Please vote your approval or disapproval as your opinions are important to the Board.

## NFSS Annual Census

#### 2007 Census Results

I am pleased to inform membership that the 2007 Census was successfully launched online at the end of last year. A total of 7,213 birds were entered by 112 participants. This data included data for 224 different species of finches, softbills, and doves and quail. All results are available online at http://www.nfssfss.org/Census/CensusReport.aspx. The new online Census allowed users to log in, set their privacy settings, and enter their birds via a quick and user-friendly interface. The Census Report page tallies the statistics and displays the results. Results can be viewed by overall results (all types of birds entered in the Census) or filtered by any of the following: Breeding Programs Only vs All Programs, Bird Type (finch, softbill, or dove/quail), Species, Mutation, NFSS Region of Participant, and Bird Region of Origin (Africa, Australia, Europe, Indo-Pacific, and South America). The report also generates the average / mean / mode / min / max number of birds or species per participant and produces a list of keepers of any given species/mutation (this list includes only those participants who chose to disclose their personal information). When we have data from multiple vears available, a new section of the report will be added to illustrate trends over time.

I want to thank everyone who participated in the Census and to encourage everyone to participate again or anew in the Census in the fall. I am currently working full time on the Finch and Softbill Save program with the hope that we can revitalize the conservation effort by bringing it online.

#### 2008 Census Is Here

The 2008 online census will be open from Nov 1 – Dec 31, 2008. I want to encourage everyone with the means to participate in the Census online to do so. The online system takes only a few moments to complete, the data is collected and tallied immediately, and you can log in at any time to change your data as long as the Census is open. You will also be able to view the overall totals as they come in. Your personal information is not disclosed unless you choose to share contact information with other fanciers.

While online participation is encouraged, mail-in Census forms will also be accepted for those without Internet access.

The Census is an important function of the NFSS. The data collected will help us assess the state of aviculture in the US and Canada, as well as analyze trends over time. Everyone's participation is encouraged no matter how many birds you keep, whether you breed or just enjoy,

whether you are an NFSS member or not. The more data we get, the better we can understand our hobby.

#### 2008 Census Instructions.

To participate in the Census online (preferred), simply visit www.nfss-fss.org/Census between November 1st and December 31st, and follow the instructions to create an account, log in, and submit your data. Returning participants may choose to log in with their previous account information or create a new account.

To participate in the Census via mail, fill out the form included in this journal and mail it to me at the address below.

Tracking mutation data is not a goal of the Census. Limited mutation data is collected only to help connect breeders. Mutation combinations are not supported, so you much choose which mutation to enter such birds under. You are free to enter all your birds as Normal (or Other) rather than enter them by mutation to keep the process simple.

#### Supported mutations are as follows:

Gouldians (body color only): Normal, Blue, Dilute, Powder Blue, Silver, Yellow, Other.

Red Throated Parrotfinch: Normal, Pied, Seagreen.

Society Finch: (All White, Chestnut and White Pied, Chestnut Self, Chocolate and White Pied, Chocolate Self, Crested (any color), Euro Black Brown, Euro Grey, Euro Red Brown, Fawn and White Pied, Fawn Self, Pearl, Other.
