Our Nominating Committee is doing an excellent job identifying officers that wish to run again, new faces to fill positions that are open and competitors for positions where incumbents are again asking for your vote. Our great new NFS lapel/hat/collar pins are now available. They depict the Zebra Finch on a white background surrounded by a black border with "The Mational Finch and Softbill Society" inscribed in gold. At just \$5.00 you'll want several. Also, our first Limited Edition Lithograph, "The Diamond Sparrou" by Eric Peaks is now available. Each one is numbered and signed by the artist and is a true "collectors item". These new items will be available at the NFS Mational Show in New Orleans.

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## NFS NEWS AND NOTES

Treasurer's Report: Balance as of May 31, 1989 was \$ 9057. Copies of the detailed report will be sent to all Board sembers.

Band Secretary's Report: 13,280 bands sold as of May 31, 1989. Size "D" by far the largest seller, a total of 6600 so far!

Judge's Panel Report: We have 26 MFS Panel Judges and 8 apprentices. The Board voted to drop from the Panel any judge whose fees are not paid after a reminder is sent. A problem with thm timely submission of reports before, during and after the show season was discussed. Dr. Decoteau noted that he was willing to send certified letters to those judges who haven't sent reports on the upcoming season to him. The following paragraph will be added to the Judge's Handbook in an effort to prevent this situation from occurring again.

"Any request by the Judge's Panel Director for the return of dated material is to be carried out promptly. Any Judge not responding shall be notified by certified mail that he will be given an additional time (to be decided on by the Panel Director). If a response is not received by that deadline that judge shall be suspended from the NFS Judges Panel for a period of one year beginning January 1 the year following the occurrence. In the case of a second occurrence of any obligations not being fulfilled the suspension shall be permanent."

Standards Report: The Diamond Sparrow Standard will be available for the Board meeting held in conjunction with the AFA Convention in Phomnix in August. Dr. Decoteau noted that statistics show that the Star Finch is the most frequently exhibited bird without a standard. Also the committee working on the Society standard, which was tabled for further study at the November meeting, needs members to send in photos of both Chestnut and Dilute Chocolate Societies as this is one of the points of discussion. Please help if you can.

Membership and Affiliation Report: 795 members and 71 affiliates as of May 31, 1989.

Publishing Report: The Editor is still playing "catch-up", more successfully now. She is sure the Jvly/August bylletin will be finished so that it will be in Phoenix at the AFA Convention. The Board authorized the Editor to look for a member who would be interested in being the "advertising director" for the bulletin. This person would look for individuals and businesses to advertise in the bulletin, help them with the layout, and would keep records of their payments and the term that their ad is to run. If this sounds like something you would like to do to help the NFS, pleasm call or write to the Editor. Thanks.

Points Director Report: See Mar/Apr for 1988 standings.

FINCHSAVE Report: The FINCHSAVE program is developing and flourishing. More than 20 species are represented, including finches and softbills. NFS President William Parlem has been invited to be a speaker at

Bill Parlee will serve as Chairman of the Star Finch Standard Committee. Anyone wishing to serve on this committee or wishing to have input on it should contact Bill.

Rusm gave the membership report. We have 721 paid members and 74 affilyatms.

Brenda stated that the bulletin publishing was nou caught up although the mailing will take a bit longer to catch up. Duce the bulletins arm in the hands of the bulk eail system the delivery time is out of our cantrol. The July/August edition was available for handout at the AFA convention, the May/Juns and July/August issues will be in the hands of members during September. Brenda also said that she needed articles and mucouraged members to write for the bulletin.

A discussion was held on improving communication between the Board and the membership. Recent bulletin improvements should help this problem a great deal.

The Mominating Committee Chair, Stephen Hoppin, sent his report which was read by Dr. Decoteau. Nominations received so far includm: Brenda Geesmy for President, Hal Koontz and Cecil Gunby for 1st V.P., Richard Bewley for 2nd V.P., Laura Bewley for 3rd V.P., Al Decoteau for 4th V.P., Harty Von Raesfeld for Corresponding Secretary; Denise Capazzi and Kenneth Bunby for Recording Secretary; Russ Areitage, Jr. and Joe Heard for Treasurer. The nominations for Regional V.P.'s are: Roger D'Connell for Northeamt; Stephen Hoppin for Southeast; Tom Rood for Central; Gene Hiller for Mid-West; Rlta D'Dell for Mountain and Helen Caudle and Marty von Rasefeld for Pacific Coamt. Al stated that he thought the committee had done a great job but it would be good to see onre competition in the election.

Jerry McCavley has been appointed the new MFS "store eanager". He ham completed an inventory of items available. Jerry said that Regional V.P.'m that want items for sale at their regional and local shows should contact him to make arrangements. He announced a contest for our next I-shirt design. New items at the store are our Jebra Finch pin which may be worn on the lapmi or collar. The cloisonne pin depicts a Jebra Finch on a whitm background, surrounded by a black band with "The National Finch and Softbill Society" lettered in gold. Thm first Dfficial MFS Lithograph In a series was announced and on display mt the NFS booth at the AFA Convention. The Diamond Sparrow Lithograph is available only in limited numbers, each numbered and migned by the artist, Eric Pmake. A half-tone reproduction and ordering information appears in this issue. Each year the Society will offer a new collectors' edition lithograph.

Jerry donated a pair of Mutation Shafttails for raffle at the convention. The raffle went over well and it was decided that raffles should be continued. Jerry has already got one scheduled for the National in New Orleans. The Board wishes to thank Jerry for his generous donation of the hirds and his hard work at the convention hooth and the NFS store.

The Board voted to raise prices on back issues of the Bulletin and some of the other store items, citing losses due to shipping costs.

The Board discussed the National Show in New Orleans and the Kaytee Great American in St. Louis.

An NFS general membership meeting was held on Thursday evening at the convention and was attended by old colleagues and new friends. Manning our booth at the convention was discussed. We operated the hooth Thursday. Friday and Saturday and much lively interest was shown.

Those aspiring exhibitors who are able to purchase proven show stock from a reliable source or who have the time, energy and faith to try to "breed up" to show stock may not be interested in the following suggestions and observations. However, for those of you with a desire to show, whose only source for birds is the local pet shop, I offer the following thoughts. (May I preface my remarks by saying that in two years of exhibiting birds my previous partner and I had seven finches place a total of 15 times on the top bench. Four of these birds were purchased at pet shops for about \$15 each. The remaining three were rejects from breeders and were obtained in trades.)

DEVELOPING YOUR EYE AND MIND TO RECOGNIZE THE "DIAMOND IN THE ROUGH".

- Spend time studying birds that you know are of superior quality until you know exactly why they are.
  - a. Attend shows and observe the winning birds closely. (Make a point to listen to the judges' comments, for some winning birds are merely the best of a bad lot.)
  - b. Yiew private collections of show champions.
  - c. Examine photographs of birds that you have the least reason to believe are fine examples of their type. (Remember that many birds chosen as the illustration for books are substandard.)
  - d. Visit zoos, bird farms and aviaries armed with good reference materials so that you can judge the quality of what you are seeing.
  - e. Take a critical look at your own collection.
- 2. Get exposure to the theory and practice of judging.
  - a. We arranged for a private clinic with a well-known judge. We spent four evenings being tutored by him and the experience was invaluable.
  - b. Convince your local bird club to invite a judge to be a guest speaker.

- c. Organize a "mock judging clinic" at which all attendees activmly participate.
- d. While watching a judge in action, try to anticipate his decisions and see how your opinions compare to his. (Unfortunately from your seat in the audience it can be difficult to see the small finches in their cages well enough to do this exercise with them.)
- 3. Collect a library of reference materials. Include books and periodicals.
  - a. Be selective in what you purchase. Buy books that receive good reviews from the experts. (There seem to be many books on the market filled with second-rate photos and vague text.)
  - b. Subscribe to those periodicals that are most helpful and interesting to you. Keep an index of the best articles for quick reference.
- Nake yourself familiar with the National Finch and Softbill Society standards.
  - a. Standards for Cordon Bleus, Gouldians, Green Singers, Java Rice Birds, Shafttails, Societies and Jebras are now in effect. Standards for Giamond Sparrows. Stars, Lavenders and others are now being evolved.
  - b. There is also an NFS Basic Standard now in effect for all finch species for which no specific standard has yet been written. This "Standard for Non-standardized species" will help you to determine what to look for in all finches.

In closing, I would like to mention what I call a birds' "show personality". I believe that a superior show quality is often the deciding factor in one good bird being chosen over another. In your search for your show prospects, keep this element in mind.

While you view a bird with this personality, you will feel an aura of imposing presence. The bird will seem poised, confident, proud and alert in its' stance and actions. It will give a physical impression of balance and symmetry. Allow yourself to sense the bird announcing to you that it is very special.

Once you have prepped yourself thoroughly and have confidence in your knowledge, you will be able to breeze through the mall on your lunch hour and spot thm \$15 Society that has the right stuff to go on to multiple top beach wims. HAVE FUN AND GOOD LUCK!



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How many species have you successfully bred?	
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The show season is either to come, here, or already past: that's according to how many shows you travel to, where you live, or when your local show is held. The show season creature is a many faceted one. There are those who work all year on their own local show, and attend just that show. There is the more traveled show creature who attends several shows in his region. Then there is the super show creature; he is the one who travels around the country from the end of summer to the deep of winter, exhibiting

There are other show creatures as well; those unsung creatures who are the "workers". The ones who hope against logic that all their work will allow their show to come off without a hitch. The show Secretaries, Treasurers, Divisional Secretaries, Stewards, and Catalog Editors, It seems like they have worked for a year to take part in, and watch, a phenomenon that lasts just a few hours.

The other creature in all this folderol is the show Judge. They are an odd lot indeed. They may drive a few weekends to shows in their area. They may become members of the "Frequent Flyers Program" of so many airlines that they never reap the rewards offered by the airlines since each time they travel they find themselves on a discounted fare of a different airline. They seldom charge what their expenses really are. They are heroes to some and bums to others. They hope to do justice to all, knowing full well that they will please 50% at best.

This pretty well defines the show season creature, except for the first-timer. The first-timer is the person with one bird to exhibit. They will go to the show the day of the show, pay their fee for showing, win or lose, and go home never understanding what it took to put the show on.

Thus, this guide to help you get through the show season, this year and next. We'll set this up with suggestions in four major sections. If you follow these suggestions, life during the show season may be just a little bit easier for you, and for those you come in contact with.

#### THE FIRST-TIMER

Try to find out what goes on at a show before the fact. You will enjoy the day much more when you know what's going on. Read this article, contact show officials ahead of time, get Dr. Decoteaus' book "Exhibiting <u>Birds"</u> by TFH Publications, read <u>American Cage Bird Magazine</u>, <u>Bird Talk</u> <u>Magazine</u> and others to find articles on shows and exhibiting. Above all, when you get to the show, ask the registrar everything you'll need to know and have fun.

#### THE EXHIBITOR

Make a decision as to the shows that you hope to attend. Listings are available in several magazines and national societys' bulletins several months in advance. Write or call the show manager and ask for a copy of the show catalog and registration forms. If you have these filled out in advance it will make your check-in much more organized and expeditious.

If you'll be traveling by air, purchase your tickets in advance to save money. Mever schedule yourself to arrive the morning of the show. If you miss a connection or the airline temporarily loses your luggage or birds you might miss the show. When making at reservations at a hotel (if the show is at a hotel) try to get a room that is convenient to the show hall.

When arriving at the show, go in first without your birds, find out where the registration tables are and where your entries should be placed while you fill out the show tags. Remember, the show has a starting time. Don't arrive after registration has ended and expect the management to turn the show upside down to accommodate you.

When judging begins, try to learn from what the judges say about different birds. Be quiet. Talk softly with associates. There is nothing worse at a bird show than a loud mouth. If you disagree with show officials on their procedures, or the judges decisions, don't be a jerk about it. Contact the Show Manager and briefly and calmly point out your disagreement. If you have not been satisfied, write to show officials after the show. If you believe critical errors have been made in actual judging, and if the judge is a panel judge representing a national society, there probably is a grievance procedure to follow.

Putting on a show can be stressful for those working on the show. Whenever you are asked to help, try to do so. Sometimes on the day of the show manager finds he is short on workers. You may even see a way to help without being asked. Ask the show manager if you can help in some way.

The club sponsoring the show you are attending needs your financial support. The registration fee seldom covers the cost of putting on a show. There are many things you can do to help. Donate items to the raffle, buy raffle tickets, purchase food and drink at the club sponsored booth and whenever possible attend the show banquet. Many of us cannot afford to take out a full page ad in the catalog. Check it out! There may be a breeders listing in the catalog that only costs a few "bucks". Be a good show citizen.

#### SHOW MANAGEMENT (THE WORKERS)

Don't wait till the last minute to plan your show. In the past few years the well organized shows are working on next years' show before this years' show has taken place. It's a good idea to have two show committees in operation at the same time. One that's working on this years' show and one on next years'. The most important job for next years' committee is the early engagement of judges. Many judges are booked a year in advance. If your show is in October, don't wait until the following March to contact judges.

Chances are you will be disappointed.

To assure the success of your show, advertise it for the three months proceeding the show in magazines and national societys' bulletins and journals. Some may charge a fee. It is well worth the nominal charge. Announce your show date, judges and show location. A person to contact for additional information is also extremely helpful.

Plan to have enough signs. Signs will help to direct exhibitors or the public to the show itself, the raffle area, the bird sale area, the judging, and anything else you want people to find. A general announcement sign at the entrance is helpful, listing the locations of major events.

If this is your first show or you will have many inexperienced workers, by all means have a show workshop. Your workers will be able to understand their jobs ahead of time and be more knowledgeable the day of the show.

Something that is often forgotten is that you want both the exhibitors and the public alike to return next year. Show your gratitude. Many have made long drives, (sometimes in bad weather) or have flown to the show at great cost. Make everyone feel that they are appreciated. Instruct your staff to try to accommodate the exhibitor in any way possible. Put your most cheerful workers in the greeting positions.

If you have a banquet, make it short and sweet. Do your best to have good food at a reasonable price. If the awards are given out at the banquet, keep other speeches to a minimum. Don't hand out two dozen awards to your own club members for doing everything including picking up after monthly meetings. This makes for a boring time for all. A major award or two for service or breeding success at a banquet in addition to the show awards will keep the banquet at an acceptable length. Don't ask judges to get up and say "how good all the birds were today". After you have heard a judge say this just once at a banquet, you know it is a recording.

#### **JUDGES**

When a club contacts you for a quote of expenses for judging their show, be prompt with your reply. Remember that you may not be dealing with individuals that are accustomed to the procedure. Help them. Make sure they will send you a written confirmation of the agreement, and that until you receive that, you will be free to accept another judging assignment on the same date.

Once your agreement is complete, you cannot change your mind and accept a different show because it is in Honolulu. You cannot change your fee. You cannot show up late.

Don't leave anything up to chance. Check a few weeks ahead of the show. Did the show make your hotel reservations? Have they sent you the airline tickets? Do you know how to get to the show? Will someone be meeting you at the airport? Get all these details nailed down. If you are making your own reservations and getting your own tickets get them well in advance and

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This article comes as a promise to Brenda for something to print in the NFS Bulletin. And as I usually insert font before opening mouth, my promise came before a topic was selected! Having just read an article in England's <u>Cage and Aviary Birds</u> on local clubs and shows, I decided to write a little bit about the local shows in my area.

It seems that as fanciers start to specialize in their favorite variety of cage bird (be it finches, cockatiels, budgies, lovebirds, etc.) they try to support their specialty club shows more and more -- often putting less importance on the local club shows in their particular area, I'm talking mainly about the new clubs or the clubs not necessarily affiliated with the NFS or any specialty clubs. We must keep these smaller clubs in mind as many new members and exhibitors get their start at these smaller shows. In time, hopefully these new people will become serious breeders and exhibitors.

We have two or three clubs in my particular area -- central Illinois. Even though these clubs are relatively new and aren't quite in the position to start affiliating with specialty clubs, hiring panel judges, etc., some quality finches are being exhibited at their shows.

My local club, the Illini Bird Fanciers, is centered in the Champaign-Urbana area. We are now about four years old and carry an average membership roster of approximately 40 people. Our annual show is held in May of each year -- for reasons that would take another article to explain. Anyway, our last show had an entry of over 350 birds -- BB of which were finches. The finch exhibitors at our show were very happy with an BB bird entry; our largest to date.

Zebra Finches usually lead the entry in our Finch Division and this year our club had separate sections for the "English Zebras" and the smaller pet-type Zebras. This worked out fairly well as some of our "non-show" oriented members brought out some of their Zebras. Hopefully a few of them will become serious exhibitors in the future. Normals and Fawns are the most numerous colors shown in out area (as expected, 1 guess). However, a nice Fawn Pied hen won our Zebra section this year followed by a Normal and a Normal Black Breasted. Pieds are also very popular in our area. Nice CFN's are talked about and sought after, but not too many are found.

Hany of our members have Society Finches and a good number are usually exhibited. Even though the Fawns outnumber the Chocolates, it is usually a nice Chocolate coming out on top. A few Dilutes are now in our area and are starting to show up at the exhibitious. Whites and Selfs are few and far between in the central Illinois shows.

Even though the Waxbill and Australian sections are on the small side, the overall quality usually makes up for it. Orange Cheeks, Red Ears and Cordons make up the bulk of our Naxbill entries. A Violet Ear or Purple Grenadier would really turn heads at one of our shows. Shmfttmils and Gouldians make up most of our Australian entries along with an occasional Dwl or Star Finch. A Red Headed Gould won the section this year going on to win 3rd Best in Division award.

The Finch Pair section is usually quite varied and one of the more popular sections of our Finch Division. This year Zebras led the pair entries followed by Societies, Cordons, Cutthroats and Shafttails. A pair of Shafttails won this section, going on to win the awards for Best in Division and Grand Champion of Show.

We do get a few Softbills in our shows with Ringneck Doves being popular. This year we had some Saffrons and Pekin Robins. A Crested Mynah won the section and took 4th in Division.

Dur largest entry always comes in our "catch-all" section -- A.O.V. Finches. This section always has good variety and excellent competition. Green Singers are always popular with the winner coming from this class. This bird was also 2nd Best in Division. Some of the other birds exhibited in our A.D.V. Finches include Silverbills, Cutthroats, Javas, Combassous, Twinspots and Mannikins. Always a nice section of birds.

A new local club was formed in Springfield, Illinois within the last year and they had their first Annual Show this past July 29th. Not knowing what to expect, the Springfield club was very happy to receive over 300 entries — BO making up the Finch Division. As I was asked to judge their finches at this show, I was very impressed with their large entry and the overall quality of birds. Their largest section consisted of 30 Zebras. Pieds and Fawns were full of quality with the two top birds coming from these colors respectively — both hens. A large CFW was 3rd.

Waxbills and Australians were small again. It was nice to see two Lavenders exhibited; a rarity in this area. However, a Cordon Bleu took the top Waxbill award. A Shafttail and Yellow Headed Gouldian placed first and second in Australians — these same two birds winning 3rd and 4th in Division. For the first time in many years a Parson was exhibited.

A nice Dilute Society won its section with Dilutes leading all color varieties. A white was even exhibited at this show.

Softbills were down in number at this show with a Pekin Robin winning. This bird hung in for a long time in the Division judging.

Pairs were again very popular with seven or eight different varieties. Best in section was a beautiful pair of Shafttails, going on to win 2nd Best in Division. Dther entries in the pairs section included Strawberries, Fires, Stars, Cordons, and of course Zebras including a pair of Florida Fancies.


Best in Division and Grand Champion of the Show came from the A.D.V. section. An excellently conditioned and staged Pin-tail Whydah took these neards. As usual the A.O.V. section was very tough with a Cutthroat and Breen Singer following the Unydah.

As you can see, we have quite a few varieties of finches in our local shows, many of which could hold their own in some of the NFS affiliated shows. We also have several NFS members in central Illinois who show their birds at these smaller shows. I believe of the 6 Best in Division awards at the Illini and Springfield shows, S of them were won by 5 different NFS members!

Possibly in the near future, we will be able to affiliate with the National Finch and Softbill Society and attract a few more entries to our shows.

The purpose of this article was simply to give you an idea of the kinds of finches you will find if you come to central Illinois. I'd be interested in knowing which variety of finches are popular in your area.

Editor's note: Great timing for this article Tom. I hope show staff and exhibitors take the time to send in some notes I can publish to let us know how the entries are running in the other areas of the country too!





Normally you will arrive the day before the show. It is difficult not to greet old friends and want to help in setting up the show hall. This is not your place. You should stay as sequestered as possible until you are called to begin judging.

Be friendly and helpful in your judging. Most are attending to be educated as well as to win. Explain what you are doing. Explain why. If you are a panel judge for a national society, take a moment when appropriate and explain rules and/or Standards. Make the judging enjoyable to all those interested in watching.

#### CONCLUSION

The show season is a special time for all judges, exhibitors and show officials alike. If things get difficult, put your best face forward. Make everyone you come into contact with want to see you at next years' show. Have a good show season.

It certainly bears repeating and I hope it sheds some light on the mystique of the show season for the first-timers and old-timers too. 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# 1989 NATIONAL FINCH AND SOFTBILL SOCIETY CENSUS

The voluntary bird census can be a valuable tool to the finch and softbill breeder. By filling out the census and wailing it in, you will furnish the census department with the necessary information to connect you with other interested parties.

Letters from members wishing to buy babies or odd birds to complete pairs at the NFS office, are a constant occurrence. Very often we can not help because the information is not available. Thus the purpose of the census. NFS has had a census for four years now, last year was the best response so far. We heard from 63 members reporting on 122 species.

This is our first attempt this year in gathering this information. Please take the time to rip out the page or Xerox it, fill it out, and mail it in, even if you had done it last year (update please).

If we can gather a meaningful amount of breeder information, we will publish it in the Sept/Oct issue. This will make the information available to all for the show season.

Here's how it works. You fill out the form and mail it in. The information is computerized. When a member calls or writes (writing is better as the computer is not always immediately available) we punch in the species, and out pops a few members telephone numbers that they can call. This sells your babies and odd birds. On the other hand, when you need something, it works for you also.

We are constantly surprised to find that a member is breeding a particular species that we did not realize anyone was breeding. We usually find out this information in a casual conversation at a show or other event. If this same information was available to other members, babies could be sold, odd birds swapped, and most importantly, breeding information shared. The info is even more important now, for the Finchsave program.

Your address will never be given out by NFS. We only use telephone numbers to connect members, so be sure when filling out the census to clearly print out your area code and number. Your cooperation with this census makes it work. Sit down right now, or as soon as you can and fill it out. Check off yes if you sometimes have babies for sale. Many finches are getting harder and harder to obtain. When giving out information we will try locate the members closest to you for convenience in shipping.

#### FINCHSAVE APPLICATION AND PARTICIPATION AGREEMENT

This Agreement is entered into by and between the undersigned (hereafter referred to as "Participant") and the Finchsave program, a specialization breeding program of the National Finch and Softbill Society (hereafter referred to as "the program").

Participant represents that Participant helieves himself/ herself to have sufficient experience breeding finches/softbills to successfully participate in the program, and

Participant represents that he/she has the breeding facility to breed at least five pair of the species designated below (hereafter referred to as "the species"), and

Participant represents that be/she has at least five pair of the species and will attempt to raise at least 25 chicks of the species each year for at least the next five years, and

Participant represents that he/she has a copy of the Rules of the Finchsave Program and has read them, and

Participant represents that he/she is a member of the National Finch and Softbill Society.

The undersigned hereby applies to become a participant in the program for the species and, if accepted, agrees to comply with the Rules of the Finchsave Program, specifically including the following rules:

- 1. Participant will devote as much time and energy to the program as is necessary to meet the goals of the program.
- Participant will complete and return each year's annual report (questionnaire) by January 31 for the previous year of participation ending on December 31.
- 3. Participant will first offer to sell surplus stock through the Species Captain if requested by the Species Captain or the Director of the program.
- 4. If Participant changes his/her address or telephone number or determines that he/she can no longer participate in Finchsave or continue with the species, he/she will notify the Species Captain and the Finchsave Director in writing immediately thereafter.
- 5. If Participant does not timely return the questionnaire or comply with Finchsave rules, Finchsave may, at Finchsave's discretion, drop Participant from the program.

- 6. Birds for sale through the Species Captain or to another participant in Finchsave shall be accurately described by Participant by pointing out the age of the birds, the sex, if known, and whether the birds have any known defect.
- 7. If Participant does not want his/her name and telephone number disclosed to the other participants working on the same species nor recognition for meeting the program's goals, Participant shall notify the Director of the program of this fact in writing at the time that this Agreement is returned to the Director. Failure to so notify the Director shall mean that the program may disclose said information to others in the discretion of the program. The program will make every attempt to maintain privacy if requested by the Participant.
- 8. Participant agrees that the National Finch and Softbill Society, the Finchsave Director, the Group Managers and the Species Captains will not have any liability to Participant arising out of any transaction or communication with respect to the program. Participant releases said individuals from liability even if they make a false statement about the quality of a bird offered for sale or fail to maintain privacy when requested to do so.
- 9. Participant will close band all chicks raised under the program in accordance with the rules of the Finchsave program.
- 10. If the program requests the Participant to write an article on the species, the Participant agrees to either write an article on the species or fill out a detailed questionnaire so the editor of the NFS Bulletin can prepare an article from the answers to the questionnaire.

In order for the Director to determine whether the Participant qualifies to participate in the program and to help the Species Captain understand how the Participant intends to breed the species, the Participant agrees to fill out the attached questionnaire and send it to the Director with this Agreement.

Participant represents that all of the information in the questionnaire is correct and encloses the #5.00 application fee with this Agreement. (Please make checks out to "MFS".)



#### Conservation

YUCATAN PENINSULA STUDY, in conjunction with PRONATURA: Yucatan. The Conservation Committee has received preliminary reports from this study of the effects of furricane Gilbert (Sept. '88) on psittacine populations of the Yucatan Peninsula. When the reports are translated from Spanish, full details will be published in Watchbird. In addition, recommendations for a survival plan will be submitted. (Hurricane damage to their usual food supply has caused Amazona albifrons nana and Amazona xaniholora to invade citrus groves, resulting in widespread killing and capture. This study was undertaken to identify normal food sources for these species during the citrus season, and to develop alternatives to prevent them becoming an annual plague on the citrus groves.)

SMALL GRANTS SUBCOMMITTEE. In addition to ongoing, internal conservation projects (such as the Red Siskin breeding consortium or Green-cheeked Amazon census), the Conservation Committee reviews proposals and recommends funding by AFA for additional conservation projects. Reports have been received from Rosemarie Gnam on the Bahama Amazon, Marie Jose Gonzalez on the Occliated Turkey, and Andre Boshoff on the Cape Pairot, For more details, watch for in-depth articles in Watchbird, along with conservation updates and Jack Clinton-Einticar's columns, "From the Field" and "Conservation Update."

At the 1989 annual meeting, approval was given for AFA to fund several additional projects: working with the newly discovered El Oro Parakeet; Glaucous and Hyacinth Macaws; macaw conservation in Mexico, Belize and Honduras; Madagascar's endemic land birds; captive populations of the Socorro Dove; the Seven-colored Tanager; Toucan Barbets; and the Highland Guan of western Guatemala.

THE FUTURE. Without conservation, aviculture has no future. In the recent International Council for Bird Preservation (ICBP) publication "Birds to Watch: the ICBP World Checklist of Threatened Birds" (Smithsonian, 1988), data is given on 1,029 threatened species and an additional 635 near-threatened species. Ten years ago (the previous list) the list numbered 290 species. As the importance mounts, AFA is taking a more active and more visible role in avian conservation. It seems tronic, but thus far most conservation activities are funded by non-aviculturists, and often by groups whose stance is anti-pet bird. Since the future starts now, isn't this a good time to change this trend?

#### C.I.T.E.S. Committee

A special CITES (Convention of International Trade in Endangered Species) issue of Warchbird is forthcoming. Emphasis will be on captive breeding and aviculture's role in avian conservation. The issue will carry no advertising, but will emphasize "Aviculture is Conservation" and feature articles by leading aviculturists and environmentalists. In preparation for the next meeting of the parties to C.I.T.E.S. (Lausanne, Switzerland, Oct, 9-20, 1989), the committee is in contact with aviculturists in Canada, Deemark, South Africa and Australia in an effort to coordinate efforts and maximize our presence in Lausanne, even to the point of staying in the same hotel. A position paper has been approved; it will be the basis of a utilingual brochure (English, Spanish and French) the committee is developing for distribution at the meeting, along with the special edition Watchbird.

#### Avian Research

Another vital facet in AFA's ayıan conservation efforts is sponsorship of various avian research projects. The research committee was formed in 1981; the first projects were approved for funding in 1982. Since then, additional studies have been funded every year covering such diverse areas as chlamydia, budgerigar fledgling disease, solid food requirements and water tolerance of cockattel chicks from hatching to five weeks old. psittacine beak and feather disease, efficacy of various disintectants against certain psittacine viruses, and handling and disturbance suess in captive pattacines. By 1988 the committee made 28 grants, for 1989 four more proposals were funded and a fifth project received tentative approval, pending the availability of funds. In order to achieve the most possible with limited funds, those grants have essentially been considered "seed money." In this way, AFA has been able to be involved in a wide variety of projects, and to encourage matching funds from other sources. Findings are usually published in Watchbird. Of the 28 projects funded through 1988, nine have been published, nine more have been submitted for publication, and ten are still in progress. In addition, results are sometimes published in other scientific journals or presented at AFA conventions or other pertinent forums. To see results of some of this research, refer to the following from Watchbird: Clinton-Eitniear, J., "Status of the Green-cheeked Amazon in Northern Mexico," Dec/Jan 1986, pp. 22-24; Gaskin, J., "Avian Reoviruses: Are They For Real?", Dec/lan 1988, pp. 38-44; Roudybush, T.E., and Grau, C.R., "Solid Food Requirements for Handrearing Cockatiets," Jun/Jul 1984, pp. 40-45. Other issues include articles on seasonal evaluation of excretory sexbormones in invenile psittacines, psittacine papovavirus, breeding biology of the Bahama Parrot, and lysine requirements of cockatiel chicks. In some instances updates have been pubhished, reflecting the findings of continued research. In months ahead, AFA In Brief will highlight some of the projects sull in
